PLAN MEETINGS TO FURTHER SCIENCE

Local Chamber of Commerce Will Endeavor to Awaken Interest in Commercial Subjects.

Announcement of the first of a series of meetings to forward science in industry, to be held February 21, was made at the regular meeting of the Chamber of Commerce directors. Subjects to be discussed will be coal, water and the use of chemistry in the steel, iron and brass industries. The lectures will be handled by competent authorities. It was reported that the agricultural section of the chamber had appointed strong committees, who were working hard on the following

ing questions, as suggested at the initial meeting of that body—hydro on the farm, city market expansion, farm help, a restroom on the market, space for parking cars, milk distribution and the inspection of herds. A committee of city members has been selected to attend all meetings of the agricultural section, including Lieut.-Col. Brown, J. H. Laughton, H. S. Fry, Gerald Pearson, Miss Mary Grant, Major Gordon Ingram, A. E. Silverwood, C. A. Mahon, Ald. Childs, E. V. Buchanan and E. S. Little.

A communication received from the St. Catharines Chamber of Commerce relative to transient traders' licenses was referred to the retail section. The St. Catharines chamber advocates a change in the act in order that the present maximum charge of \$350 may be increased.

C. R. May was appointed a member of the directorate, replacing D. H. McDermid, resigned. Mr. May is secretary of the Rotary Club and has always exhibited a keen interest in Chamber of Commerce endeavors. E. H. Morrow, director of extension work at the Queen's University,

Kingston, will address the members March 1. He is an outstanding authority on commercial education, and has shown great interest in the movement in London recently to teach business subjects at the university.

AUDITOR FINDS PROFIT SMALL

Confirms Report That Refund for Gas Users Will Be Slight.

NO DIRECTORS' FEES PAID

Deduction of Ready-To-Serve Charge Would Mean Operation at Loss.

The intimation contained in a recent issue of The Advertiser, that there would be little left of the ten cents set aside by the City Gas Company by order of the legislature to go back to the people, is seemingly confirmed in the report of Auditor A. G. Calder to the city.

This report was put before the finance committee Wednesday night, no action being taken on it, other than to have it printed in the minutes. It showed that in 1920, the company, outside the readiness-to-serve charge of \$60.123, suffered a loss of \$613.49. From May to Dec. 31, 1921, the company shows a profit of \$6,275 after crediting to the customer's refund account \$20,253. Included in the latter amount is \$6,395.52, readiness-to-serve charge, and if this item is deducted there will be a net loss of \$29.51.

The information on the readiness-to-serve charge is looked upon as important, inasmuch as an action was launched last week in an effort to have the monies collected by this charge refunded to the people. The amount has been generally estimated at \$55,000.

No Director's Fees Paid. Mr. Calder found that the five officials of the company were paid salaries totalling \$11,520 annually. No director's fees are paid and no dividends have been declared during the past couple of years. He found that the total salary and wage roll of the company was \$107,096 in 1921, and \$116,989 in 1920.

Production costs per 1,000 feet of gas, he found to be as follows: 1920, \$1.14078; 1921, \$1.114; May 3 to Dec. 31, 1921, \$1.1865.

The last item on cost is of interest to the consumers. The legislature in granting the company a rate of \$1.25, ordered that it set aside 10 cents per thousand, and if it was found that the company was making an excessive profit, a portion or all of the ten cents might be ordered refunded. As the cost of producing has been \$1.18 to date, it is certain that the whole ten cents will not be refunded. Mr. Calder also points out that depreciation of the plant has not been provided for in the cost figures, but will do so when completing the audit after May 3, when the period expires.

Surplus Increased. The report gives the state of finances of the company at the end of December as follows: Assets, \$341,785.57; liabilities, \$295,657.10; surplus account, \$299,098.47; capital stock, \$256,999.00. Total, \$341,785.57.

It is to be noted that the total of the surplus account at the end of 1920 is given as \$287,165, and at the end of last year had increased to \$290,098.

The gas appliance department, a subsidiary branch, showed a loss of \$5,449.42 last year.

The total revenue received by the company last year was \$378,524.31, plus \$25,628.59 received for by-products. The total expense plus \$2,496 for depreciation was \$383,843.36.

The committee took no action on the report other than to order it printed in the minutes.

Ald. Ashplant has the matter of paying the aldermen for their services on the council sent onto the council and the outlook is that there may be a merry discussion on the subject. There are some sharp opinions held on this subject both for and against. Ald. Ashplant says that the legislature would not have put the measure on the statutes if it did not deem the paying of the aldermen desirable. He declared that the aldermen would feel more responsible.

Mayor Opposes Move. Mayor Wilson said that it would destroy the spirit of public service but stated that he would let the aldermen thresh it out among themselves at the council meeting. Ald. Judd is strongly opposed to the proposal.

Ald. Ashplant wanted to know if the recommendation of J. G. Richter, that Messrs. Steel and England be retained on the assessor's staff has been carried out.

Mayor Wilson said that the two had been retained until the valuation of West London had been completed and then they were let out. It was about Feb. 1.

Ald. Ashplant wanted to know if others had been put in their place. "No, their services were no longer necessary," replied the mayor.

Several bowling and billiard hall proprietors asked the city to reduce its license fee, inasmuch as they were now being called upon by the province to pay a fee almost double that of the city. Mr. Catalano, J. J. Dyer and others were in the deputations.

Mayor Wilson said that the city could not give up its revenue from this source and did not think that the aldermen had a right to step in. He suggested that the city take the matter up with the provincial authorities.

The deputations asked, that if they were forced to pay the two licenses, that they be allowed to keep open until 12 o'clock and the extra hour might in a measure reimburse them.

Tenders Received. Five tenders were received for firemen's uniforms. Four firms, Selkirk, Firth, Tip-Top and Orth's, tendered on the uniforms, the prices running from \$23 to \$33. One firm tendered for the chief and assistant chiefs' uniforms at \$77 each. The tenders were left to the chairman and the chief.

Ald. Ashplant wanted to know if the city employees were being paid their bonus this year. He pointed out that if such was the case and the council decided when the estimates were up to cut off the bonus, this would be retroactive to the first of the year.

Mayor Wilson said that the bonus

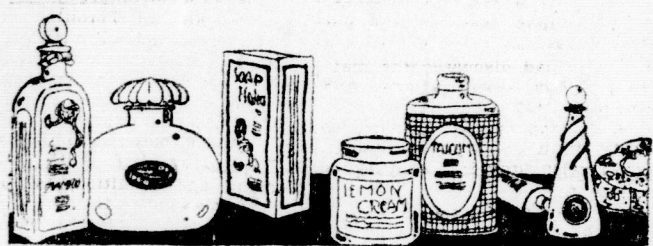
