

The new British premier is obviously anxious to shake himself clear of expensive commitments and military responsibilities in the Near East, but it is equally plain that he could not authorize a tame compliance with Turkish demands without losing many votes at the polls on the 15th. The British people may be, and certainly are whole-heartedly averse to war, but there is such a thing as national pride, and if the Kemalists marched into Constantinople and spread rapine and pillage far and wide, Mr. Lloyd George and other critics of the new government would be presented with a deadly weapon against the Law ministry and its career would probably be cut very


