

mate Figures Secured From Welfare Headquarters. How much do you pay for charity?

Now that the welfare drive is over. a comprehensive answer to that question can be given. There are about twenty public fa-

stitutions for the sick, aged, friend-less and under-privileged whose exstence depends on the amounts, h voluntary and obligatory, subscribed to them by the average citizen. Spreading the total over a population of 60,000, the individual yearly contribution to charitable organizations in London is surprisingly low. It is substantially less than the amount spent annually on the five largest moving picture theatres in this city.

The average citizen helps his less fortunate brothers and sisters living in London to the extent of a fraction over \$10 a year. And the average citizen spends \$15 a year on moving pictures for his own amusement.
