DAIRYMEN WILL OPEN CONVENTION HERE TOMORROW

Hon. John S. Martin and Other Prominent Speakers Will Address Delegates.

HAVE BIG PROGRAM

Tomorrow the 57th annual convention of the Dairymen's Association of Western Ontario opens in the Masonic Temple, where exhibitors and dairy farmers from all over Western Ontario will compete for the various trophies offered.

Several speeches and discussions will be heard during the two days of the convention in progress, among the speakers being Hon. John S. Martin, provincial minister of agriculture; J. A. Ruddick, professor of dairying, University of Guelph; Wade Toole, George A. Putnam, Alex. McKay, J. B. Reynolds, M.A.

A number of judging and grading competitions have also been arranged, carrying with them cups and shields. Special prizes consist of various accessories and supplies essential to dairy farming.

INSPECTOR SUCCESSFUL IN CHARGE OF CRUELTY

Essex Farmer Found Guilty of Not Properly Caring For Horses.

Humane Inspector G. A. Tustin arrived back in the city this morning after successful prosecuting a case of cruelty to animals in the Essex county court.

Mr. Tustin charged James Gerard, a farmer of Essex, with cruelty, and stated that it was one of the worst cases he had seen. The farmer had kept his horses in a stable that had not been cleaned out since it was built and had fed the animals but half a bale of hay since Christmas.

When the case was called Monday, the courtroom was full of farmers, who listened to the case. Gerard was found guilty and let go on suspended sentence after paying the costs of the trial, amounting to \$104. This included fees of two veterinary surgeons, six witnesses, stabling and feeding of the horses, solicitor's fees and court costs.

Youth Calmly Announces Bullet Wound in Stomach

Explains He Is Late For Supper Because He Was Shot.

HIT WHILE SKATING

Harry Kincaid Worries Little Over Narrow Escape From Death.

Answering an inquiry of his mother relative to his reason for being late for dinner last night, Harry Kincaid, 119 Garfield avenue, calmly stated that he had been shot in the stomach while skating in the afternoon, and that he had just come from the hospital, where he had the wound dressed and bandaged.

Further questioning from his mother drew out the story, which, according to Harry, disclosed a remarkable escape from serious injury, if not death.

Skates On River.

After school yesterday afternoon, Harry, who is the 13-year-old son of C. Kincaid, a foreman at the Universal Garage, went skating on the river behind McClary's foundry. Several of his schoolmates from Tecumseh school were there, and the boys were enjoying themselves.

One of them, 15 years old, had a .22 rifle, with which he was shooting at a tin can stuck on the ice. Just as he fired a shot Harry glided in front of the direction the rifle was pointed. The bullet, after hitting the tin continued on its way, ricocheting off the ice. It glanced upward and tore through Harry's sweater and underclothing, grazing his abdomen. Crying that he was hurt, he turned to the boys, who immediately took him to the hospital, where the wound was dressed by one of the internes. The boy was also inoculated against poisoning.

The shooting occurred at 5:15 p.m., and at 6:50 Harry was home again apparently none the worse for his experience.

Seen by The Advertiser last night, he was sitting at the table enjoying a game of dominoes with a chum.

Back To School.

"It stung pretty much at the time, but I don't feel it much now. My arm where it was inoculated feels much sorer. I guess I will be back at school tomorrow."

That was how he dismissed the experience. His father and mother had different views, however, their feeling of thankfulness being great. The father stated that had the boy been going the least bit faster on his skates he would have received the bullet in the stomach and thereby have suffered serious injury.

Detective Sergeant Harry Down visited the boy's home shortly after the younger returned home and informed them that he had found the boy who did the shooting and had taken the rifle away from him after pointing out the danger of his act.

Any action that may be taken will be done by the juvenile court authorities, both boys being under 16 years of age.

AUSTRIAN WIDOW FREED ON CHARGE UNDER O.T.A.

Maurice Gootson Again Acts in Behalf of Mary Burbitch.

Mary Burbitch, the Austrian widow who was charged last week with violation of the O. T. A. was dismissed this morning when Maurice Gootson, local junk dealer, again appeared in her defence.

Mrs. Burbitch was convicted last summer of having liquor in other than a private dwelling. To celebrate the Austrian Christmas which comes on January 5, she purchased a quantity of wine and was forthwith nabbed by the police.

Mr. Gootson claimed she was ignorant of the law. She was therefore let off on \$400 bail supplied by Gootson last week and in the interval the liquor was sold.

Mr. Gootson explained the situation again to the magistrate.

"But it was said that you supplied the money to buy the liquor yourself," Mr. Gootson, "the court said."

The other denied this and claimed that she had no money when she was taken last week had been instructed to tell nothing but the truth.

"I'll dismiss the case," said the court, "but Mrs. Burbitch must not keep liquor in her house."

TEAR BOMBS ARE USED TO DRIVE OUT MANIAC

Winnipeg, Jan. 15.—After holding members of the provincial police at bay, Bill Novick, a demented Russian homebreaker of the White Mountain district, about 100 miles south-east of Winnipeg, was driven from his home by the use of tear gas bombs Sunday afternoon, provincial police headquarters reported here last night.

The Russian escaped from the house when the bombs were thrown in, but was captured after an 18-mile chase, and disarmed without a struggle.

Armed with an assortment of firearms and knives and obtaining a plentiful supply of ammunition, Novick barricaded the doors of his house Saturday, and threatened to shoot anyone approaching. He had a brother prisoner, but neighbors notified the police of the maniac's action.

W. TURNBULL'S TAX PLAN SAID SIMILAR TO NEW PROPOSAL

Merchants Here Indorse President's Ideas To Abolish Sales Tax System.

BIGGER INCOME LEVY

London manufacturers, discussing the labor recommendation made to Ottawa, that the sales tax be abolished, pointed out this morning that the plan proposed to replace it is virtually the same as that suggested by William Turnbull, president of the Ontario Wholesale Grocers' Association, who recently described the system to The Advertiser.

Mr. Turnbull's suggestion finds ready approval from wholesale and retail merchants here. His plan is to levy an increased tax on incomes. This, he says, would eliminate the many complexities of the present sales tax and make for greater economy so far as collections are concerned.

To The Advertiser, Mr. Turnbull outlined the scheme.

"Many people, particularly the laboring class, seem to think they escape taxation through the operation of a sales tax," Mr. Turnbull said, "but if they do not pay directly, they pay indirectly, and usually much more than they would if the tax were levied on all incomes."

Of course, it would be folly to impose a big tax on persons drawing large incomes only. Everybody must contribute in paying for the war.

"As a man's income becomes larger he would naturally pay a proportionately higher tax."

"The interest on Canada's national debt is \$4,000,000 annually. Necessarily, under the sales tax system, the consumer shoulders the whole burden, and the cost of the system is tremendous. All this could be avoided by the imposition of an additional income tax."

An educational campaign, showing the people that money they would gain by submitting to an income tax arrangement by which every salaried man, wage earner and proprietor of a business would be compelled to part with a proportion of his income, would replace the sales tax, would bring great benefit to the country, Mr. Turnbull declared. The income scale would be graduated so the big earners would pay higher percentages than the smaller ones.

"Thousands of young people, making from \$1,000 to \$1,200 a year, who live at home with their parents, would, under this plan, be enabled to accept their share of the country's obligations."

Members of the finance committee, at their inquiry session tomorrow night, will consider thorough street railway problems, Chairman Douglass stated.

The city has received certain money from the common council that it would be advisable for the committee to accept this. We could have the city solicitor's opinion, of course," he explained.

It is the chairman's desire, however, that a definite report be brought in to the council Monday night.

CARTER SEES MORE DELAY BEFORE OPENING OF TOMB

Luxor, Jan. 15.—Fully three weeks, perhaps months, more delay before the shrines in the tomb of Tutankhamen can be dismantled and the pharaoh's sarcophagus reached, Howard Carter, in charge of the work, made known yesterday, saying it was possible that the joinery of the shrines might compel him to alter the scaffolding and the whole plan of dismantling operations, thereby delaying still further the opening of the sarcophagus.

The raising of the lid of this immense quartz coffin, which Mr. Carter estimates may weigh a ton or two, will be an operation of the greatest delicacy in the confined space in which the excavators must work. Mr. Carter describes the sarcophagus as very large and long. It is of a grayish-pink hue, its curious tint suggesting that it may have been painted. It is more than eight feet long and about five and a half feet high. These are rough estimates, as only the front of the sarcophagus has been seen.

NORRIS SUPPORTS MOVE TO ASSIST AGRICULTURE

Canadian Press Despatch. Winnipeg, Jan. 15.—The third session of the seventeenth legislative assembly of Manitoba was convened last night and debate on the speech from the throne commenced.

Stating that the measure for the single transferable vote was the only piece of legislation mentioned in the throne speech, Hon. T. C. Norris, leader of the opposition, intimated that he intends to support the government in all the legislation of which it had formally given notice.

Commenting on the need of aiding the agricultural industry, Mr. Norris spoke vigorously in support of the Dominion government removing alcohol from the duty on agricultural implements as a means of offsetting the proposed increase in the cost, and indicated that he will propose a resolution to this effect for adoption by the house.

RELIGIOUS STUDY IN SCHOOLS URGED

London Presbytery Asks 15-Minute Period Every Day.

Religious education in the schools occupied the greater part of the morning session of the London Presbytery which concluded with the passing of a resolution that the school trustees be approached in the matter of introducing a period of 15-minute religious study every day.

Several speakers were heard on this subject, among them being Inspector Thompson, Inspector McKillop, and Messrs. McCrae, and McGillivray.

The resignation of W. H. Geddes for 25 years pastor at Ailsa Craig was accepted with regret to take effect on January 31. Several members of his congregation spoke in glowing terms of Mr. Geddes.

MAN OF MANY ALIASES FACES MURDER CHARGE

J. Barkin Caught, in Montreal, Will Be Taken to Detroit.

Montreal, Jan. 15.—Arrested in this city on a charge of passing a worthless check, John Barkin, alias James Patterson, alias Parks, and said to be wanted in Toronto on a similar charge, pleaded not guilty before extradition Commissioner Choquet to the murder of James Brennan at Grosse Ile, near Detroit, on Dec. 14 last.

After pleading, Barkin waived extradition proceedings, but must appear in enquete court here Friday before he can be sent to Detroit. It is thought that the charges here and in Toronto will be dropped in consideration of the capital charge.

MEXICAN FEDERAL ARMY OPEN DRIVE ON REBELS

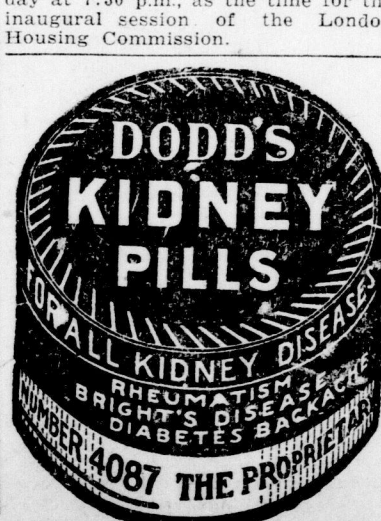
Associated Press Despatch. Washington, Jan. 15.—The advance by Mexican federal troops against the revolutionary army on the western front began today and will continue until the issue is decided, the Mexican embassy said in a statement yesterday giving advice from Mexico City.

The rebels who attacked Pachuca, have been driven back and suffered heavy losses," the statement continued. "Tehuacan was recaptured by federal troops last night. Yesterday at Esperanza. The precipitate retreat was halted near El Carmen plantation and a battle has been in progress there since Sunday afternoon."

"Federal troops have launched a general attack on the city of Caxaca and its capture is momentarily expected."

MANY REFUGEES PLAN TO COME TO CANADA

Bucharest, Jan. 15.—Robert Brunel Rumanian delegate to the League of Nations, estimates after an investigation that there are in transit in Rumania 4,000 Russian Jewish refugees of whom approximately 1,500 plan to go to Canada. The others hold U. S. visas and are awaiting a chance to go to the U. S. under next year's quota.



TRADES AND LABOR COUNCIL CHOOSE HEADS TOMORROW

Growth of Local Organization Predicted This Year—Annual Meeting.

2 CONVENTIONS COMING

The annual meeting of the Trades and Labor Council, to be held on Wednesday night in the Labor Temple at eight o'clock, will see the election of officers for 1924.

The meetings of the council have not been as well attended as they might have been during the summer and autumn of last year owing to disturbing influences introduced by certain events of a large number of the officials, however, is that this year will see a growth and strengthening of the council and of its activities. It is hoped that with the selection of new delegates from the locals in the city renewed interest in the council and that more may be accomplished than in the past.

It is customary to nominate members for office at the regular meeting in December and to elect them at the first meeting of the year. This year, however, owing to the poor attendance of delegates and the generally unsettled condition of affairs in the council, the nomination has not yet been held, and on Wednesday night the men who are nominated will also have to defend their position.

There is no one specially in view for the presidency in the event of Jack McGuire, the present president, not being re-elected. Officials are hoping for a large turnout of delegates so that the officers may be really representative of all the locals in the city. In view of the fact that the Dominion Trades Congress convention and the annual convention of the Canadian Labor party will be held this year in London, it is essential, they say, that a thoroughly efficient and representative executive of the Trades and Labor Council should hold office.

SEVEN PERSONS HURT AT RIVERDALE SLIDE

Accident Occurs When Bobsleigh Carrying Party of Twelve Overtakes.

Canadian Press Despatch. Toronto, Jan. 15.—Seven persons were hurt, three so badly that their removal to the hospital was advised by the attending physician last night when their bobsleigh struck an ice bank and overturned on the Riverdale slides. In all there were 12 on the sleigh when the accident occurred.

Five men, two women and a child, were on the sleigh when it overturned and jumped to their feet. They assisted in carrying the injured to a doctor's office from where three were rushed to St. Michael's Hospital, while the others were removed in ambulances to their homes.

Bessie Blair, aged 19 years, struck the ice slide with terrific force, rendering her unconscious. George McDonald, aged 13, was suffering from a nasty scalp wound and cuts about the face. Harry Murphy, aged 15 years, received a deep cut in his head and face. Others after medical attention were removed to their homes.
