

## VETERAN GERMAN EDITOR

Brest, Prussia, March 23.—Heinrich Von Korn, proprietor of the Schlesische Zeitung, is dead. He was 78 years old, and left a fortune of about \$22,000. The paper, which is one of the oldest in Germany, has been in the family for one hundred and seventy-five years. It is Conservative in politics and represents the views of the landed nobility.
