





A Jockey Killed at Brighton. Leafs are confident. NEW YORK, Sept. 2.—The weather at Brighton Beach to day was bracing and invigorating, though somewhat chilly. There was more than an average attend ance. The track was in good condition ddressed. A sad accident occurred in the second race A sad accident occurrent of the most promis-by which Moran, one of the most promis-instantly killed, by which Moran, one of the most promis-ing young jockeys, was instantly killed, and two other jockeys, Garrison and Lane, narrowly escaped the same fate. Thirty-one horses started, although twenty-two owners had applied to have their entries withdrawn, considering the number too great on this track to give their animals a reasonable chance to win. Some of the owners also feared just such an accident as anfortunately occurred from the overslugging, and it was understood the affair was simply a boxing exhibition, and he decided it on these points. nerrowing of the track. At the half mile post Moran, who was riding Miss Daly, and, as well as could be made out through the

well as could be made out through the dust, was in third place on the outside; with Joe Howell a little in front, closely followed by Garrison on Bilzard. Lane on Bonnie Lee was suddenly pitched high into air. A moment later the two other jockeys were thrown. Moran's neck was broken and death was instantaneous. When the fact of his death became known many ladies in the grand stand were affected to tears. the grand stand were allected to tears. Moran's remains by permission of the coroner were removed to the temporary home of his mother at Sheepshead Bay, Garrison and Lane, who were thrown at the same time with Moran, were not
