 THE YEAR WAS ALL THE MORE INTERESTING BECAUSE OF THIS CABINET DATE SATURDAY.

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 Ottawa, Ont., Sept. 29.—Thursday, Nov. 21, has been chosen as Thanksgiving Day for the year as last year, although in 1894 the date fell on the fourth Thursday. An order in council was passed Saturday fixing the date of the meeting of Parliament.

Mr. George Johnson, Dominion Statistician, has just issued a report on the industrial census for 1891. The report shows that the manufacturing industries in Canada have increased by 69.7 per cent since 1881. The report also shows that the total value of the products of the manufacturing industries in 1891 was \$1,000,000,000.

Advices have been received here that the Nova Scotia schooner *Carrie C. W.* has been wrecked on the coast of the United States. The schooner was carrying a large cargo of coal and other supplies. The crew and passengers were rescued by a United States cutter.

The Marine Department has awarded a silver watch each to four fishermen of Seaside, Inverness County, for the rescue of a schooner and her crew. The fishermen were acting bravely in the face of a severe storm.

The French committee of the Separate School Board has appointed a list of teachers to fill the places of the Christian Brothers, who have resigned on the 20th. Most of them are Ontario men.

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HERESY CASE IN MONTREAL

A Divinity Student Takes a Sensation—Mr. Girouard, Teleducator—The Demers Trial.
 Montreal, Sept. 29.—Mr. Justice Girouard, the latest addition to the Supreme Court of Canada, will leave here Monday, and take his seat in the highest tribunal of the country on Tuesday.

Mr. Girouard is a well-known lawyer and has been a member of the Supreme Court of the Province of Quebec. He is expected to bring with him a wealth of legal experience.

The Demers trial is expected to be one of the most important cases in the history of the Supreme Court of Canada. The case involves a question of the law of torts.

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AN ULTIMATUM TO CHINA

The British Consul Grossly Insulted and Deceived—Warships Sent up the Yangtze-Kiang and a Demand Made for a Treaty's Dismissal—Government's Course Warmly Approved.
 London, Sept. 29.—A despatch from Peking to a local news agency, says the British Government has addressed an ultimatum to China demanding that the Peking Government issue within two weeks a proclamation degrading the Chinese admiral in Chinese waters.

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PROF. PASTEUR DEAD

The Eminent Chemist Succumbs to an Attack of Paralysis—A National Funeral Offered by the Government.
 Paris, Sept. 29.—Prof. Louis Pasteur, the distinguished chemist and discoverer of the Pasteur treatment of the cure of rabies, is dead. Mr. Pasteur expired at 8.30 Saturday evening at his residence at Garches, near St. Cloud. His death was caused by paralysis of the brain.

Prof. Pasteur's death has caused a great deal of mourning in France. He was a man of great scientific achievements and a devoted citizen.

JUDGE FERGUSON SAID NO

Offered and Declined Promotion to Supreme Court.
 The Judge-ship Also offered to Other Ontario Superior Court Judges—Should Any One of Them Accept, Mr. J. F. G. C. Likely to be Appointed a Superior Court Judge.
 There has been considerable talk around Osgoode Hall for the past few days regarding high judicial appointments. The intimations in The World two days ago of a further impending change in the Supreme Court bench at Ottawa was led to much speculation as to who would succeed Judge Gwynne, everything pointing to him as likely to soon follow Judge Fourie's example and step out. From present appearances Judge Gwynne will occupy his seat on the Supreme Court bench for the coming term; a few days ago it seemed otherwise.

The World learns positively that Mr. Justice Ferguson has declined to accept a promotion to the Supreme Court bench, preferring Toronto and its attractiveness as a residential city. He has also declined the capital for nine months of the year.

It is said that others of the Superior Court Judges of Ontario have refused the offered honor. The difference in the pay between the two positions is not sufficient to induce any of the judges to agree to the change. If one of them does accept, Mr. J. F. G. C. is likely to be next on the slate for judicial honors.

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
