It will be of interest to the many friends of the Rev. G. B. Ratcliffe, B.A., to know that he has recently received the degree of B.D. from Union Theological Seminary, New York, where he has been pursuing a course of post graduate studies since leaving Arkona last September.

Dedication of a solid oak lectern, gift of the Fletcher family in honor of their parents, the late Mr. and Mrs. Edward Fletcher, took place at evening service the Church of England Petrolia Sunday evening. The services were conducted by Canon Hill, former rector, who returned from London for the occasion.

Veterinarians and cattle experts of the St. Thomas district are puzzled over the mysterious deaths of seven valuable young cattle belonging to W. F. Moore, a Shelden farmer. The cattle, which in sweet clover pasture, virtually went mad according to reports, frothing at the mouth and staggering about the field as if blind. Two hours after the first symptoms were noticed the animals were dead.

A very pleasant afternoon was spent when the pupils of Miss Agnes McAlpine, assistant principal of the Alvinston continuation school, gathered in her class-room and presented her with a handsome onyx ring, prior to her departure for her home in Caledonia. The address was read by Ralph Connor and the presentation made by Elmore Chalk.

One misfortune after the other has come to Clarence, son of Mr. Chas. Sifton, of Metcalfe, the past week or two. Two weeks ago he fell and broke his leg. This was followed a week ago by pneumonia, and on Saturday a beautiful little colt, a full sister to that wonderful trotter, "May-go", the property of Clarence, was killed by lightning. We are glad to learn however, while seriously ill, he is on fair road to recovery.

During the electrical storm on Saturday night the residence of Duncan Robertson, con. 2, N.E.R., Adelaide, was struck by lightning, the bolt passing through the roof and entered the bedroom in which Mr. Robertson's son was sleeping, and strange to say, although passing only two feet from the bed, the child was uninjured, save being slightly stunned. The bolt passed from there downward into the cellar, but no damage save the chimney and a hole in the roof was done.

The historic old buildings at Amherstburg which link the present with the early history of the country; and which have done much to make the town attractive to visitors, are gradually disappearing. Last week the ordnance building, which stood on the site of old Fort Malden for a century and a quarter was torn down to make room for a garage. The old wooden block house, its rifle openings still visible, is also said to be slated for demolition.

One of the largest funerals held in Wyoming was that of the late Mr. Rice. The late Mr. Rice was a faithful member of the Methodist church for upward of 50 years and will be greatly missed in the community. He had, with the assistance of his son, Frank, conducted a hardware store in Wyoming for many years and was up until a week ago, able to go about his duties as usual. He was 76 years of age and leaves to mourn his loss his widow, four sons and one daughter, also a brother and a number of grandchildren.

One of Western Ontario's best-known Liberals passed away Thursday in the person of Henry Stewart Ivison at his residence, London. Mr. Ivison, who was 81 years old, came to London from Wheatley. He was always an ardent worker in the interests of Liberalism, and for many years was president of the Liberal association at Wheatley. Prior to coming to London he was in the livery business in Wheatley and Leamington. He is survived by one brother Oscar Ivison of Thamesville and two sisters, Mrs. Jane Craig of Wheatley, and Mrs. William Dales of Leamington. The funeral was held at Wheatley.

At Wardsville on Sunday evening Thos. Creegan was severely cut in the neck and almost bled to death when two motor cars collided at a street intersection. Creegan was thrown partly through the windshield. He and the McDonald brothers of Strathburn were driving home from Ridgetown in a Chevrolet car, and when opposite O'Mara street a Ford car driven by Hugh Lamont came down a hill and crashed into the Chevrolet, which was almost completely wrecked. Creegan was the only one seriously injured. Dr. Glenn dressed the injuries and found Creegan's neck to be badly lacerated by the broken glass of the windshield, which narrowly missed the jugular vein.

Petrolia Topic:—Ontario has in its employ over 29 sheriffs who are 70 years of age or over. One in active employ has attained the age of 90 years. It is proposed to superannuate these, the lowest annual allowance to any one person being \$900.00. Why Sheriffs or other public servants, who have always commanded good salaries should receive retiring pensions and honest, hard-working, laboring men be left to shift for themselves is beyond our ken. There should be retiring pensions for all.

Hon. W. R. Motherwell's bill, designed to regulate the sale of potatoes, has been given its first reading in the House of Commons, and will become law before the end of the season. The bill regulates the size of barrels and containers in which the potatoes are offered for sale, that all potatoes, onions, beets, carrots, turnips, and parsnips offered for sale

without tops, must be sold by the pound, avoirdupois. The bill will have a far-reaching effect in Western Ontario particularly, because of the large acreage there devoted to root and vegetable farming.
