PORT LORNE

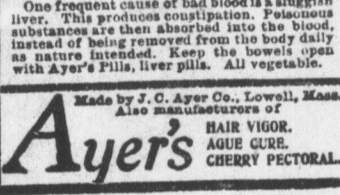
