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English Classics for School Reading.

Edited with notes. By William J. Rolfe. *Tales from Shakespeare's Comedies. Tales from Shakespeare's Tragedies.* By Charles and Mary Lamb. (New York: Harper & Brothers.) In the original preface to these charming "tales" the authors "requested the kind assistance of young gentlemen in explaining to their sisters such parts as are hardest for them to understand" and also in reading to them from the original, "carefully selecting what is proper for a young sister's ear." This request has suggested to Dr. Rolfe the plan of the two neat little volumes before us. He has in a series of good notes explained the harder passages and there have been added (unfortunately in too small type) selected passages from the plays themselves. Our readers do not need to be reminded that the "Tales from Shakespeare" are really, in spite of their modest title, a valuable contribution to Shakespearean criticism, and Dr. Rolfe's edition deserves the title of an introduction to the reading and study of Shakespeare.

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
