SPECIAL MEETING OF SYNOD.

Toronto, Wednesday, 20th July, 1851, Theelee o'clock, noon.

The Synod of the United Presbyterian Church in Canada, called speeasily, met, and in the absence of 12: Taylor, the moderator, the Rev. Alexander Ritchie, the former moderator, took the chair, and constituted

The clerk read a resolution passed at the last redefinit of the last ordinary meeting of Synod, at Hamilton, on the 10th of June, of the purport following, viz '-- 'That in case of a communication in reference to the appointment of a Professor of Theology, being received from the Board of Missions in Scotland, either nominating a person or persons, in their judgment, fit to fill that office, or stating difficulties, in their opinion, in the preparat state of the reference to them mourmountable, that the moderator he instructed to ca'l a pro re note meeting as soon as possible. to take the whole case into consideration."

In connexion with this resolution, there was read a letter from the Rev. Andrew Somerville, Secretary of the Board of Missions in Scotland. dated 5 Queen Street, Edinburgh, 23rd May, 1251, in the following seems, vis :

My dear Sir - I duly received your 1-tier with extract minutes of a meeting of your Synod, held at Hamilton, or, 2. ? There documents were submitted to a meeting of the Committee on Foreign Missions, held on the 6th May, when it was agreed to refer them to the Synod. They were accordingly brought before the Synod on Thursday foreness, the 15th current, and very cordially entertained. The Rev. Mr. Torranco stated very clearly the wishes and claims of the seek in Canada. Various members expressed their views as to th stance of the measure, and the strong desires felt by the Home Synod jo do whatever is necessary for premoting the interests and secusing the prosperity of the Mission in Caunda. After considerable deliberation, it agreed to remit the matter to the Board of Missions, carefully to gonoider it, and with full powers to look out for a suitable person, and to adopt such measures an shall seem best fitted to meet the wishes of you A meeting of the Board was called and held on the 20th, a ly to consider this subject, and in order that a communication might est to you, so as to be in time for the meeting of your Synod in June, rising you of what has been done. After long and auxious discussion, ing points were unanimously agreed upon as in the judgment of the Board calculated, should your Synod assent to them buth the way for getting the services of a duly qualified person, and for answerthe ends of his appointment :-

In the first place, it is their opinion that the salary should be £250 riling. A man of talents and high standing, such as the Board would wish to procure, can scarcely be expected to leave this country and to e out to Canada on a smaller allowance. But as the Board are awa that your Synod have offered as much as their present resources put it in their power to pay, the Board beg to state, that they are willing, for a presenable period, to assist you in giving the above salary. It is hoped that your Bynod will regard this offer of the Board as a proof, on their

part, of slavere desire to obic. a for you a man of emisence. In the second place, it is their opinion, that in the present circumstances of the Church in Canada, it is necessary that the Professor have a pasteral of the Church in Canada, it is necessary that the Frofessor have a pasteral sharge. Both is the Synod and in the Board the queroin was put, whe-ther it would not be advantageous that he should not have a pasteral charge. Now, there can be no doubt, that were the congregations of the Synod nemerous, and fully supplied with ministers—were there a consi-derable band of students, and had the Frofessor opportunities for operating heardically upon the whole Church, it would be better that he had or personally upon to whose Cautre, it would do better that he and not personally upon the personal care who who will give an appreciation to the personal care and to such measures as seen fitted to advance the good of the whole body. But, in the third place, it is their very decided opinion, that the his charge should be either in Hamilton or in Toronto. He should He should be in a central and influential position, where he may favorably represent your cause, and both by his jubile appearances and by his pen advance the cases, and come years proceed your body. It is quite obvious that this would not be the case, and that the important ends for which a Professor is asked from this country would not be gained, were he settled in It is quite obvious that a small country congregation, or in a distant and back-woods locality .-Ind circumstances suit, it would be better were he lecated in Teronto, the capital city, that being the reat of the Hall. The Board scarcely hope to be alid to prevail upon a suitable minister to accept the appointment, unless it be distinctly understood and fixed, that he is to have such a public and central charge, as Hamilton or Toronto offere; and so strongly do the Board feel on this point, as being necessary for the best interests of your Church, that they would be prepared to some time to give a larger sum to support a Professor in such a central locality—till a charge could be found a around him. The Board have instructed me to present these views respectfully for the consideration of your Hynd, and a source you that they have received your communication with the livelikest interest, that they look upon this appointment as a measure of very great imputance, and that they will do every thing in their power to find a minister duly qualified by his scholarship, cound views, netive habite, and high character to promote the welfare of your Church, and to have young men to be faithful and successful preachers of the guspel. On motion of Mr. Thornton, seconded by Mr. Coutts, it was usualmously resolved.—That in regard to this proposition, the Synod readily admit the desirableness of a Professor occupying a "public and central position;" they nevertheless deeply regret that a stand should have been taken upon this point, in such a way as to seem to them incompatible with Constitutional and Presbyterial Law-that both places referred to as the seat of a pastoral charge being filled up, they have no ability or desire to move in regard to either, and that if either had been open, they have no right to dictate to the people in their choice of a minister-feeling bound, however, to regard it as a strong way of stating the desirableness of such a location, if the way were, in Providence, open, the Synod assure the Board that there is little probability that a Professor will require to go into the "back-woods" in quest of a charge,—that not a few localities highly favorable for the object in view will be open for any reasonable constitutional, and Christian-like efforts to occupy them.
