McDonald. He says that the existing methods of presenting expert testimony in criminal trials is imperfect and unsatisfactory. The two wils in this procedure at present are the sclection of medical experts by counsel without reference to their qualifications and standing, and the absence of eny standard of qualification. The remedy is to be found not in an official board of experts, but in an endeavour to select only men of acknowledged skill in the particular branch of medicine that is to be represented.
