

## CARDINAL McCLOSKEY.

THE first American Cardinal was born | gave promise of a brilliant career. Conin Brooklyn, in the year 1810. The city of his birth now boasts of half a million inhabitants and contains more than fifty Catholic churches; but in the boyhood days of the present Cardinal it contained no Catholic temple and had a population below five thousand. Trained and equipped by a three year's absence in Europe, he returned to New York, and a projected diocesan seminary not being ready for occupation, was appointed to the pastorate of St. Joseph's Church, where his zeal and gentleness won all hearts.
