Mr. Joyal wants the prisoners bound over to keep the peace for a length of time, on the ground that since their recent arrival from the Old Country they have been repeatedly engaged in quarrels.

REV. FATHER FOX, the venerable rector of St. Mary's is now engaged in giving a retreat at St. Mary's convent, Notre Dame street, to the girls who are to make their First Communion to-morrow morning, the Feast of Corpus Christi. A similar retreat will be given in St. Mary's church next Friday for the boys who are to make their First Communion on the Feast of the Sacred Heart. In the afternoon His Grace, the Archbishop of St. Boniface, will administer the Sacrament of Confirmation to all, at St. Mary's.

THE circular recently sent to officers of customs, in the matter of dealing with the public, states that numerous complaints have been made to the department of incivility to the public and the use of insulting language by officers of customs at frontier and other points. Collectors are, therefore, requested to inform every member of their staff that any charges against officers which may be received at the department in future will be strictly investigated by officers specially detailed for that purpose, and any official in the customs service who may be proved to have acted in an offensive manner to persons transacting business with him will be summarily dealt with. Collectors are further to impress upon their officers that it is the determination of the department to insist upon the most courteous treatment being accorded to the business public on all occasions, and they are to remember that it is an essential part of their duty to be prompt in the disposal of matters brought before them, and to be invariably careful to afford all the information and assistance in their power to persons having business relations with them.
