kilometres. At 24 percent of total revenue ton kilometres, cargo is more important for overseas traffic (other international) than it is for either domestic or transborder. For overseas traffic, 14 percent of cargo is carried by charter service, versus 86 percent by scheduled services. Cargo is somewhat less important for transborder services, reflecting
