Mr. Macdonnell: My very last point is this. I should like to draw to the attention of the committee one or two opinions expressed in the press. We are not alone in this; indeed, it is heartening to us to realize the extent to which public opinion seems to be with us.

Mr. Sinclair: It only seems to be, for the first time in 40 years.

Mr. Macdonnell: In fact, it is rather astonishing.

Some hon. Members: We want Sinclair.

Mr. Macdonnell: I shall read some brief expressions of opinion that were quoted in the *Toronto Globe and Mail* today.

Some hon. Members: Time.
