Question No. 1,687—Mr. Rowland:

1. What were the federal expenditures on the Canada Manpower Training Program in each of the fiscal years since 1967-68, together with the estimate for 1971-72, for each of the five regions of Canada?

2. How were these expenditures in each of the five regions distributed among (a) purchase of full-time training from the provinces (b) allowance payments to trainees (c) purchase of part-time training from the provinces (d) administrative costs incurred by provincial and municipal governments (e) apprenticeship-training (f) training-in-industry?

3. What were the total administrative costs in each of the four fiscal years, incurred by the Department of Manpower and Immigration in connection with the Canada Manpower Training Program?

Departmental accounts are not structured to reflect the administrative costs because referral of clients to training is only one of the tools used in the ultimate matching of clients to occupations. Therefore, the administrative costs for the Canada Manpower Training Program are very closely interwoven with other administrative costs and any apportionment of costs on an estimated basis to the Canada Manpower Training Program would now have to be done arbitrarily and thus be misleading.

GRANTS TO INDIAN STUDENTS

Question No. 1,734—Mr. Godin:

Does the government subsidize the Indian students who are educated outside of their reserve and, if so, what amount is granted in each province to students (a) at the primary level (b) at the secondary level (c) at the college level (d) at the university level?

Mr. Judd Buchanan (Parliamentary Secretary to Minister of Indian Affairs and Northern Development): Yes. (a) and (b) In most cases, the amount is negotiated by means of joint school agreement with the Province concerned. The amount in dollars paid to, or on behalf of, students may vary owing to regional disparities in the cost of living, the negotiated tuition fees and grade level of the student, the number of books he requires. (c) and (d) At these levels, the students receive training allowances to cover the costs of tuition, books and supplies, board and
