

OFY—WOMEN AND MARRIED STUDENT EMPLOYEES

Question No. 617—**Mr. McKenzie:**

1. How many OFY employees in 1971 and in 1972 were women and how many were married students?
2. What percentage of all of OFY employees were women?
3. What percentage of all OFY employees were married students?
4. How many and what percentage of women and married students employed by OFY in 1971 and in 1972 returned to university each fall?

Hon. James Hugh Faulkner (Secretary of State): 1. The Opportunities for Youth Program provided employment to 7,403 women in 1971 and 13,449 in 1972. There are no available statistics on the number of married students.

2. In 1971, 26.6%; in 1972, 44.9%.

3. There are no available statistics on the number of married students.

4. There are no available statistics for 1971. In 1972, 22,046 or 73.6% of all Opportunities for Youth project participants said they were continuing their education in the fall of 1972; these statistics were not broken down by sex and marital status.

OPPORTUNITIES FOR YOUTH PROGRAM—LOTBINIÈRE

Has the Department of the Secretary of State invested funds in the constituency of Lotbinière through the Opportunities for Youth Programme and, if so (a) what is the amount (b) what is the complete list of individuals responsible for accepted projects (c) what was the amount of each grant allocated and the number of jobs thereby created?

Hon. James Hugh Faulkner (Secretary of State): A list of all projects funded under the 1972 Opportunities for Youth program has been completed. Projects are classified by province and in alphabetical order of the towns and cities in which the projects were carried out, not by constituency. Information includes the project title and number, a short description of the projects' activities, amount of the grant, number of participants, and the name and address of the project representative. This 421 page listing can be obtained from the Secretary of State Department.

ISSUANCE OF STAMP TO COMMEMORATE ROBERT BURNS

Question No. 655—**Mr. Macquarrie:**

Is it the intention of the Post Office Department to emulate that of the U.S.S.R. and other countries in issuing a stamp honouring the great poet Robert Burns?

Hon. André Ouellet (Postmaster General): It is not the intention of the Canada Post Office to issue a postage stamp honouring the Scottish poet Robert Burns. The policy of the Canada Post Office is that subjects selected for postage stamps should illustrate the cultural and economic life of Canada or contribute to an awareness of our traditions, accomplishments and history. Only ten to twelve subjects can be selected each year from several hundred suitable themes of significance and interest to Canada and Canadians. The revised commemorative

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stamp programme for 1973 is as follows: 31 January, François de Laval; 21 February, Algonkian Indians; 9 March, Royal Canadian Mounted Police Centennial; 18 April, Jeanne Mance; 16 May, Joseph Howe; 8 June, J.E.H. MacDonald; 29 June, Centennial of Prince Edward Island's; Entry into Confederation; 2 August, Royal Visit and Commonwealth Meeting; 14 September, Bicentennial of Arrival of Scottish; Settlers at Pictou, N.S.; 10 October, Nellie McClung; 1 November, Christmas; 28 November, Algonkian Indians.

4. Have any monies been designated for use at (a) Ste. Scholas-tique Airport (b) Malton Airport (c) the proposed Pickering Airport and, if so (i) what are the amounts in each case (ii) over what period?
