CANAGREX

Question No. 90 Mr. Porter:

- 1. What was the cost to the government of all aspects in establishing Canagrex?
- 2. What was the dollar value of export sales it was successful in closing?

Hon. John Wise (Minister of Agriculture): 1. Total expenditures, to October 31, 1984, in establishing CANAGREX amounted to \$2,659,000.

2. When the Corporation began operations in the spring of 1984, policy focused on facilitating sales by bringing a willing buyer and seller into a negotiating position, rather than on purchasing products or selling for the corporation's account. Operating in this manner, CANAGREX was involved in negotiations leading to facilitation of sales worth \$16 million. In addition, there were transactions in process worth a potential \$100 million expected to be finalized by March 31, 1985.
