letter from Chinese Legation, Washington

to

Mr. XXXX Golden Yuen (President of Nationalist Party in Montreal)

Dated January 18, 1932.

In reply to your letter of the 14th instant, stating
"since the Japanese invasion of Manchuria not only C hinese but
all human beings are greatly disturbed and anxiously hoping that
to help check these wrongs. I have privately answered many
important figures in the Canadian government, especially those
connected with military services, including the quartermaster—
general, that they may transport ammunitions and experts officers
in varied lines, especially in aviation, to China to help. I have
already secured the consent of the Minister for Aviation of Canada
that he himself, if he should be invited by the National government
of China, would accept the position and render the service. But
since the matter is so important, after I had long distanced telephoned
to you, I am told to communicate with you in writing. I therefore
write to ask you to dispatch an emissary here, in oreer to have
direct conference and to decide the result."

Since Minister W. W. Yan has left Washington on the 15th on his way to Eyrope for the League of Nations meeting, we cannot give you any definite reply. We therefore are inviting you to communicate directly with the N ational Government in Nanking.
