As far as I can judge of the subject, I imagine fuch a plan of reconciliation would be likely to be attended with success, if Great-Britain were to adopt it immediately, before the mutual injuries and miseries of actual war between the two countries shall have alienated and imbittered the minds of the contending parties beyond all possibility of return to their former confidence and affection. And I therefore most fincerely wish it may be followed.---But now, as we have finished the discussion of this important subject, it is time to put an end to this conversation; which I do by most heartily acknowledging the obligations I lie under to you for the pains you have taken to fatisfy my, (sometimes, perhaps, inordinate,) curiofity upon the various topicks that have occurred in this discourse.
