tioned in Parliament with singular respect. Some of the most powerful speakers in that assembly displayed their eloquence in sounding his praise and humenting his fate.

By direction of Congress, a monument of white marble, with emblematic devices, was exceuted by Mr. Cassiers, at Paris, and it was erected to his memory in front of St. Paul's Church, in the City of New-York. His remains were, by act of the Legislature of the State of New-York, taken up by his nephew, Col. L. Livingston, in the month of June, 1818—the place of burial being pointed out by an old soldier, who attended the interment 42 years before—and were conveyed to the city of New-York, where they were again committed to the dust in St. Paul's Churchyard, with the highest civil and military honors. At that time, his widow was still alive.



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
