

(a) There is no provision in the Statutes governing the University or University College for instruction in "Religious Knowledge" or "Theological Subjects" by either of these bodies;

(b) Instruction in both of these subjects is being given;

(c) This work was allotted to the federated Universities and Colleges;

(d) These latter bodies have therefore ground for complaint and the right to demand that this illegal interference with their rights shall cease.

BIBLE TEACHING.

You refer to the large number of students who are attracted to the lectures above referred to. As the minds of an increased number of young men and women are turning to the mission field, there will no doubt be more students from year to year ready to take advantage of the options or instruction referred to. The Theological Colleges may for this reason look forward to many additional students.

I believe that this is the cause of the increased interest in legitimate Bible study, which I hope may continue, notwithstanding persistent efforts made in and outside of our Theological and other institutions to frustrate such study by seeking to make the Word of God of none effect by the ever-changing notions of a noisy class of men who take for their motto: *Quantum est quod scimus*, instead of the more lowly one—the mark of the truly learned, as he picks a pebble on the vast ocean of learning—*Quantum est quod nescimus*. It will be an evil day for our Ministers, Missionaries and Teachers should God permit that what appears to be about the only sure standing ground left us in the world be shaken to its centre; that the statement, "The Word of God which liveth and abideth forever" is pro-
