

ADJOURNMENTS.

SEC. 4.—At ten p. m., if no one has the floor, or as soon thereafter as the floor is unoccupied, any member may move the adjournment of the debate. If carried, the mover has the first right of opening the debate on its resumption. If the Club refuses to adjourn the debate, a motion for a division may be taken, in which case two-thirds majority shall be necessary to divide the Club on the debate.

PRIVATE DEBATES.

SEC. 5.—All regular debates of the Club shall be open to the public after 8.30 p. m., unless immediately after the announcement of a debate, as required by section one, a motion is carried by a three-fourths majority that the public be excluded from the debate.

HONORARY SPEAKERS.

SEC. 6.—On motion carried unanimously, a person not a member of the Club may be permitted to speak on any regular debate before the Club subject however to the rules governing the debate.

SUBJECTS FOR DEBATES.

SEC. 7.—Any subject may be proposed or debated which does not include any question of theology.

N. B.—On November 20th, 1890, on motion carried, so much of Article IX as relates to the placing of names to be balloted for on the notices of meetings, was suspended until January 1st, 1892.
