### BOSTON LOOKING FORWARD

To a Most Successful Season of Hockey.

BOSTON, Dec. 22.—The hockey fans of Boston are looking forward to the most successful season ever known in this city. The people have in a measure been educated to the game, and their enthusiasm is nearly as great as that displayed by the Canadians who understand more thoroughly the fine points of the game and appreciate real "inside" work.

The arena management has planned to import the best Canadian teams it can procure to compete with the International and E.A.A. teams, the former team playing under the name of Victorias last season, while the E.A.A. team were known as the Boston Hockey Club. They are both strong amateur teams, being composed of fast skaters and good stick-handlers. They recently furnished one of the fastest games ever played at the arena, the score resulting in a tie.

Whether or not hockey will be a success in Boston depends upon how far the management of the Boston Arena will allow Capt. Winsor to pick the teams with the B.A.A. shall play, and whether he will be allowed to dictate rules foreign to visiting teams. Time and again this hockey captain, who attempts to dictate to Canadian players on matters pertaining to the rules, has delayed the starting of games, and the public who make hockey possible, are kept waiting until Mr. Winsor's wishes are acceded to by the opposing team. A captain of one of the best amateur teams that visited Boston last season in speaking of the game, said he was dumfounded when at the beginning of the second half he noticed that Capt. Winsor had substituted no less than five fresh players, the most of them the pick of the Harvard team, of which Winsor is coach. To say the least this is hardly fair to the visiting team, who would find it impossible to carry two teams or seven out of a game.

While Winsor is allowed to dominate hockey affairs in Boston, just so long will the development of the game be handicapped.

### NEW DIRECTOR OF G.T.P.

President of Molsons Bank Will Strengthen Management of Road.

Mr. William Macpherson of Quebec, president of Molsons Bank, was elected on Thursday a director of the Grand Trunk Pacific Railway.

Mr. Macpherson is an old Toronto boy, and is the only surviving son of the late Sir David Macpherson of Chestnut Park. Mr. William Macpherson lived in Toronto until he moved to Quebec to take charge of large steamship interests there; since then he joined the board of Molsons Bank (his mother was a Molson) and has been actively identified with the big interests of the Dominion. Sir David Macpherson, along with the late Sir Casimir Gzowski, contracted for the original Grand Trunk Railway, and they made a fortune out of that enterprise. Mr. Macpherson ought to prove a source of strength to the board of the Grand Trunk Pacific. Mr. E. R. Wood of Toronto is also on the board.
