"That the aid given by Canada
shoud be in addition to the existing

security."

Mr. Churchill deprecated the putting
of further questions on the subject
pending the approval by the Parliament of the Dominion of Canada of
the naval proposal put forward by
Rt. Hon. Robert L. Borden, the Canadian premier.

CANADA MERELY **LENDING SHIPS**

Leading Liberal Journalist Declares
New Policy is Tending Towards
Disunion and Bitterness.

LONDON, Dec. 9.—(C.A.P.)—H. W. Massingham, the leading Liberal journal st, has an article in several pape s today declaring that Canada practically lends its ships rather than g ves hem, and clearly stipulates for a control of Brita.n's foreign policy.

"How is this to find expression," asks the writer. "What will the share of the dominions be? If it is large, our own powers are improperly limitel; if small, the dominions may be taxed at our mandate. In any case, the old colonal relationship is gone, and a new formidable organ of war, o. policy—I fear of disunion and bittern si—will have been created.

"Let us therefore walk with care and deliberation this new path of empire. We don't know where it may lead us."
