SIX-DAY BIKE RACE OVER A PAPER TRACK

New York, Nov. 1.—This year's international six-day bicycle race at Madison Square Garden in the week of Dec. 1-7 will be held over a paper track. A well-known manufacturer has made a preliminary lay a track such as has been used in use in Paris for several years.

The new track, which is more durable than a wooden course, and insures greater speed. The cost, too, is much less. It is made of a material which is revolutionized six-day racing. The invention was announced by the owner of the track, who is only a question of procuring the material. A ten-foot track 40,000 square feet of material. It can be built in sections and can be put together in about five hours. It takes about two hours to lay a board track, which becomes a permanent track.
