Fewer Places Where Liquer is Sold and Increase in Public Schools.

Several annual reports were laid on the table of the legislature yesterday by the provincial secretary. That of the inspection of liquor licenses shows the inspection of liquor licenses shows the number of licenses for the year 1904-5 as follows: Orinary 2495; beer and wine 21; for six montas, ordinary, 55; beer and wine, 7; snop, 298; whole sale, 22; a total of 2898, compared with 2974 the previous year. The revenue to the province was \$297,825.44, compared with \$304.677.70 the previous year. The total collections, \$637,762.58, and the municipal revenue \$248,492.60. The fines collected were \$21,004.33, compared with \$20,465. There were 4157 commitments for drunkenness, an increase of 567. For the past five years the average has been 3188.


