Mr. Parham is fresh from holdings meetings at Toledo, Ohio, where, according to the Toledo press, many converts were made, several received the "gift of tongues," and hundreds of interested citizens were turned away from the meetings.

Mr. Parham told The World that in October, 1900, he was led of God to open a Bible school in Topeka, Kansas, where some 40 students entered for the study of the Bible. No fees were charged, no collections made, no solicitation for board money, nothing, but that day after day, God filled their mouths, and supplied all their wants in answer to their prayers.

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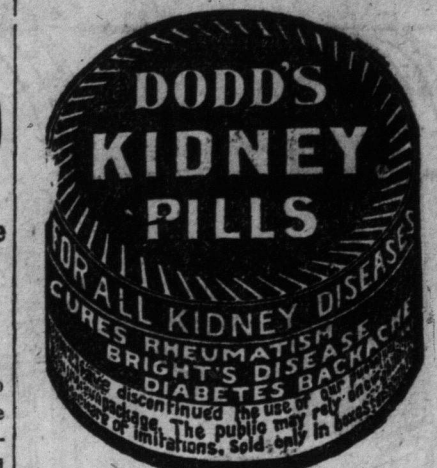
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TO ANNUL A CHARTER.
Minnesota Brings Action Against Great Northern Railway.

St. Paul, Minn., Jan. 26.—Attorney-General Young began mandamus proceedings today in the supreme court to compel the St. Paul, Minneapolis & Manitoba Railroad Co. to show cause why its charter should not be forfeited.

This company, formerly known as the Minnesota & Pacific Co., is the parent company of the Great Northern Railway Company, and the Great Northern is joined in this issue, as it is the owner of the Manitoba company's stock. Chief Justice Stuart ordered the writ to be issued, and directed that a return be made on April 2 next.

Attorney-General Young has given out a digest of the allegations in the complaint. He says, in part: "Last March, when the taxes of this road for 1906 became due, the Great Northern, which operates the road under an alleged lease from the Manitoba company, paid only 3 per cent. of the unpaid 1 per cent. of its taxes under the new law, in the suit, immunity from any increase above 3 per cent. in its taxes is claimed under the charter of the Manitoba company. Another claim is that the Manitoba company is entitled to exemption from the rate of taxes paid at the purchase of the road in 1873. The suit is not yet disposed of. The railroad taxes for 1906 will be due in a few days, and there will be an additional amount of \$10,000,000. The road is mentioned in dispute for that year.

"We are convinced that the Manitoba company is no longer entitled to exist as a railway company, and that the speediest way to dispose of its claim to exemption from the rate of taxes paid by other railways is to annul its charter. It is the duty of the state to protect the public interest, and in this event the Great Northern will be obliged to pay taxes at 4 per cent., the same as other companies.

"We are also of the opinion that the Great Northern should not be allowed to continue to pay taxes at 3 per cent. The United States kept saloons, and Emma Goldman always stays with saloon-keepers.
