Chicago, May 16.—Eather Dowie, daughter of "Dr." Alexander Dowie, proprietor of "Zion," and alleged "leader," died Wednesday night of burns, having suffered for hours while her father prayed for her. He refused to call a physician, and she naturally died.


Canada's Trade.
