

2. Ratepayers who have duly paid the first instalment, and, on or before the 15th day of September prefer paying the school rates, shall be entitled to a reduction of one per cent. on the same.

An addition of five per cent. shall be made to every tax rate or assessment, or any part or instalment thereof, remaining unpaid after any of the dates herein mentioned for the payment thereof, and being the ac ual instalment or instalments then in default, and it shall be the duty of the Collector of Taxes to collect by distress or otherwise all such taxes or instalments of taxes as remain unpaid, together with the said percentage charge of five per cent.
