



The present Lord de Blaquiere was formerly in the service of the Bank of Montreal. Miss Howard's father was the late G. H. Howard, who came out to Canada with his uncle, Thomas Swinyard, manager of the Great Western Rallway, and was the latter's assistant. On leaving the service of the G. W.R., Mr. Howard established a private bank at Niagara Falls, Ont., and was a coal importer. The latter business grew to such di-mensions that he moved his headquart-ers to Buffalo some years ago. Miss Kathleen Howard began her musical studies there, continuing them in New York and abroad. She has sung with the Pittsburg Orchestra and created a very great impression by the beauty and quality of her voice, which is a remarkably rich and pure contralto. She has been engaged by Stewart Houlston for the tour of the Cold-stream Guards' Band, and subsequent-ly will be heard with Pattil.
