KAISER RUSHES BIG SHIPS

Keels of Vessels of Dreadnaught Type Shortly To Be Laid.

Berlin, Nov. 2.—Fresh details are published of the restless energy with which Germany is accelerating the completion of her fast-expanding fleet. The keel plates of the new battleships of the Dreadnaught class and the huge new armored cruiser will be laid within the next six weeks.

Several thousand extra workmen will be employed, which will render it possible for the ships to be completed within the period originally fixed—in the same time, that is to say, as has hitherto been required for the construction of battleships displacing only 12,000 tons.

The first of the German Dread-

naughts will be launched toward the end of 1907. The contractors have promised the imperial government that all the ships ordered shall be ready to hoist the pennant and join the German fleet by the spring of 1909, unless their trials should greatly delay their commissioning.

It is also announced that the new German destroyers of 525 tons will have four engines, in place of three, as hitherto, and will develop 10,000-horsepower. Their artillery has been greatly strengthened, to enable them to deal with any other destroyers afloat or under construction.

STOCK SWINDLER IN BIG STEALS

U. S. Federal Police Land Man Who Robbed by Millions, They Say.

Chicago, Nov. 1.—Charles Whitney Norton, said by the police and postal authorities to be responsible for extensive swindling operations, is under arrest here, and will be turned over to the federal officers by the local police, who took him into custody.

It is claimed that Norton has defrauded people in all parts of the United States out of bonds and securities amounting to \$3,000,000.

It is claimed by the officers that Norton would obtain stock from any person who would trust him and agree to sell it in the market.

He might, the police declare, sell the stock, and he might retain it, but the result to the person owning the stock was the same. They would receive no money from Norton, nor would the stock be returned to them.

Norton taken into custody by the police three days and held him without preferring any charge against him until a search could be made for securities said to be held by him aggregating in value about \$3,000,000.

In his room were found bonds, stocks, the greater part of which were thought to be genuine, and worth about \$2,000,000. Other papers were found valued on their face at about \$3,000,000 more, but the higher value is doubtful.

It is claimed that Norton by selling and trading these securities has made many thousands of dollars.

The postal authorities declare that they have been searching for Norton since January, 1905, when he disappeared from Detroit, ostensibly to go to England.

It is claimed by the police that Norton solicited stocks and titles of all descriptions to sell. When pressed by customers for money for the stock turned over to him he informed them that he would go to London in order to obtain a better market.

Titles and deeds to lands in Nebraska, Kentucky, Virginia and other states, running into thousands of acres, were found in Norton's possession. One deed described 50,000 acres of pine lands in Virginia and another describing 20,000 acres in Nebraska appeared to be genuine.

The papers also include gold mining stocks, and stocks of copper mines, insurance companies, railways and gas companies.

Norton was today still held by the local police, but the postal authorities declared their intention of causing his arrest on a charge of using the mails to defraud.

A federal warrant was served upon Norton late in the afternoon and he was taken to the county jail. He will be arraigned tomorrow before United States Commissioner Foote. The specific causes for which Norton was arrested was in connection with the stock of the Monroe Mining and Smelting Co. of Arizona.

A business man in Peoria, Ill., secretary of the mining company, sent to Norton for sale 8,000 shares of the stock. This man failing to obtain either the stock or its price from Norton resigned and came to Chicago and engaged in the brokerage business.

Norton after returning to this city entered the Chicago office of the former Peoria man, and offered him the same stock which he had given to Norton for sale. His arrest followed within a short time.

It is claimed by the federal authorities that Norton was enabled to make deals for stock business of highly favorable character, but forged reports of himself, said to be issued by a prominent mercantile agency.

THE ONTARIO BANK

Curator Has List of Big Operations in the New York Market.

Toronto, Nov. 1.—The curator of the Ontario Bank has in his possession an almost complete list of the stock speculations engineered by Charles McGill, the former general manager, with New York and Toronto brokers, and the items cover a thick bundle of separate sheets.

According to the list in one day, that of June 14, his dealings with one New York stock exchange firm comprise two totals, one of \$400,000 and one \$250,000, or .650,000 for the day, and an idea of what a free-hearted speculator McGill was is shown in the following figures, which show the volume of his operations on separate days with only one broker in New York, the one mentioned above:

These days are picked out at random, and do not each represent a maximum of operations. For the five days indicated the total is \$1,075,000.

The loss to the bank through the speculations of the ex-general manager is officially stated as being \$1,500,000.

A meeting of some shareholders of the bank was held this afternoon at the office of Mr. Cyrus Goode, 1,200 shares being represented out of a total of 15,000. A committee was appointed to look into the legal position of the shareholders and to see what recourse may be had against the directorate of the wrecked institution.

The committee consists of Earl of Cumberland, Andrew Darling, W. J. Farland, C. Goode and C. S. Czwolski. The committee will endeavor to obtain proxies from other shareholders.

KING'S DAUGHTER IN POOR HEALTH

The Princess Victoria to Reside in the South of Europe.

London, Oct. 31.—Princess Victoria, the only unmarried daughter of King Edward is likely to be seen but little from henceforth in London society. Her health, always delicate, instead of improving, has become more frail, so much so that her physicians insist that she should from now on spend the greater part of the year, and especially the winters, in the south of Europe.

In fact, negotiations are already in progress to purchase for her use a villa with extensive grounds somewhere on the French Riviera, and several of them, notably, the late Lord Salisbury's beautiful, Sir Edward Malet's Chateau Malet, at Monaco, and the place bequeathed by the late Capt. Percival to the widow of his friend, Prince Leopold, Duke of Albany, have all been under consideration.

Her spring health became so bad that she was obliged to leave London quite early in the season, and to proceed to Scotland for complete rest and quiet, and when she later on attempted to fulfill her promise of attending the coronation of her sister, Maud, as queen of Norway, she once more became so ill as to excite considerable alarm on the part of her medical attendants.

The princess will be sadly missed by both her father and mother. As the one member of the family who has remained at home, she has been in quite a special degree the companion of both her parents. It may be remembered that on the occasion of his yachting trips, after his operation, and also after the fracture of his knee cap some years previously, the King insisted upon having his daughter Victoria on board throughout his cruises, and in the same way she has usually accompanied her mother on the occasion of the latter's stays in Denmark, and elsewhere on the continent.

She has two particular friends, who will doubtless share between them the attendance upon her as ladies-in-waiting. They are two sisters—the Hon. Mrs. Derek Keppel and Lady Musgrave, both daughters of Lord Suffolk, and elsewhere in the world have been on terms of intimacy with the princess since their earliest childhood, their father and mother being the oldest members of the King and Queen's households.
