RICH STRIKE OF GOLD QUARTZ

About 200 Miles South of Juneau.

A Peculiar Formation—New Range of Mountains Discovered.

Juneau, Alaska, Nov. 3, via San Francisco, Cal., Nov. 14.—An almost incredibly rich quartz strike was recently made, and is now being mined, near Ketchikan, more than 200 miles south of Juneau. It is located on the Cleveland peninsula of the mainland. The claim was staked and is owned by a man named Johnson, who lives at Ketchikan, and a young man named Dyer, of Seattle, who has been prospecting in the vicinity for several months.

If the rock continues to produce gold as it has begun, Johnson and Dyer have not only the

but a fortune which nothing can exhaust, unless they shovel gold into the sea as fast as it is pounded out. It is located close to salt water, in a position easy to work. Authority for these statements is A. P. Swineford, who was governor of Alaska under Cleveland's first administration.

Former Gov. Swineford within the last few months came to Alaska from Marquette, Mich., and made his residence here. He is interested in mining property in the vicinity of Ketchikan, and elsewhere in Alaska, and has recently returned from there. He says: "I never saw anything like that vein. After one week's work with an adze, Johnson and Dyer cleaned up 25 pounds pure gold, and worked only about eight hours a day. They told me it wasn't a very good or very large adze, either."

A SURPRISE.

"Previous to this Dyer wanted to go to Seattle. He didn't have enough money to buy a ticket, and so he and Johnson went over to a place where they located to try to pound out enough free gold to pay for his fare. Up to that time they did not know what they had."

"After they had knocked a few hundred pounds off the outcropping they came to rock on which the free gold stood out in spots as thick and as big as the perspiration on a man's brow. They began to pound it out with hammers in small mortars, and the result in free gold was so abundant and promising that they kept up the work for more than a week."

"When they quit they had \$3,200 in gold. The formation is peculiar. The gold is not a quartz vein, but in a sort of schist alongside of the quartz. It is unlike anything that has ever been found in Alaska. The boys are now twelve feet down and sixteen feet in on the ledge."

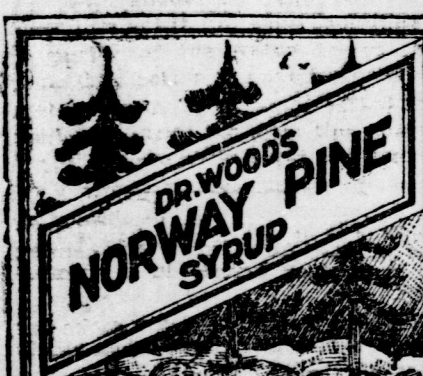
NEW MOUNTAIN RANGE.

The steamer Dora arrived on Sunday at Seattle from Cook's Inlet, Alaska, with about twenty passengers. Among them was Lieut. Spurr, who, with a party of three, had been surveying the territory between the Kuskokwim and Sukta Rivers. Lieut. Spurr discovered a new range of mountains several hundred miles in length running from Lake Clark to the head waters of the Tanana. The average altitude of the range is from 7,000 to 8,000 feet.

IN LABOR'S FIELD STILL ANOTHER RAILWAY WAR

Winnipeg Cigar-Makers Want More Money.

A Miners' Strike Settled—Ottawa Street Railway Employees Propose to Form a Union.

Winnipeg, Nov. 14.—The cigar manufacturers have refused to accede to the cigar-makers' demands recently made for higher rates of pay. They claim if they granted the demand it would be impossible to compete with eastern firms.

STRIKE SETTLED.

Carlinville, Ill., Nov. 14.—The difference between the Chicago-Virgin Coal Company, at Viridian and Auburn, and the striking miners, have been settled, and the shafts will soon be in operation. The company agrees to pay the state scale of forty cents per ton, but did not want to tear down the stockade. Finally the company accepted the offer of the miners that they would take it down and charge the company nothing for the labor.

OTTAWA STREET RAILWAY EMPLOYEES ON THE MOVE.

Ottawa, Ont., Nov. 12.—Encouraged by the victory of the London street railway men, the employees of the Ottawa system will hold a mass meeting to press on the men the importance of the union. Since the recent negotiations with the company, and the acceptance of the new schedule, the union has dwindled down to a few men. The recognition of the union by the London street railway will be the theme of tomorrow's discussion, which may result in an effort being made to gain recognition of some such similar arrangement with the company.

PARADISE FOR GAME

Algonquin Park an Excellent Field for All Kinds of Wild Things—Beaver Increasing Rapidly.

Recent reports from the Algonquin Park state that game, including moose and red deer, is very plentiful there. The red deer have become so tame that at Canoe Lake, where Gilmour's large mills are situated, three or four of them are frequently found among the lumber piles. They appear to be quite tame in consequence of the immunity they enjoy from persecution to which ordinary, unincorporated deer suffer. The enemy of the deer is the wolf, which increases in numbers as his prey becomes more numerous. Beaver are very plentiful indeed. Lakes and ponds long since abandoned by the beaver have become restocked, and fresh beaver work has been visible this fall throughout the whole park. Ducks are also fairly plentiful, and pheasants abound. Wild rice is being sown in some shallow lakes in the park to provide food for wild ducks. It is proposed to introduce caribou, capibara and black game from Europe into Algonquin Park, as the forest and climatic conditions there are believed to be quite suitable for them. In reports from Rondeau Park, in the county of Kent, state that the English and Mongolian pheasants put into Rondeau Park in 1891 have become acclimatized, and are now running at large in the woods in considerable numbers. The moose and deer placed in the park are also doing well, and are much admired by visitors, as these animals are now something of a rarity in this district, once the home of great numbers of these animals. Wild ducks are very plentiful at Rondeau this fall.

Ohio Central Opens Fire on the C. H. and D. Pa. and Hooking.

The Michigan Central May Try to Upset the L. E. and D. R. R. Bonus Bylaw.

The trainmen on the Windsor division of the Grand Trunk Railway are being examined on the new rules recently issued by the company. A. G. Manley is examining the men, and does not expect to get through with this work for three weeks.

The Michigan Central Railway will take steps to upset the bylaw granting a bonus of \$20,000 to the L. E. and D. R. R. to assist in constructing the Ridgeway extension. The petitioners will allege that bribery was resorted to to secure votes for the bylaw.

Onatham Planet: The officials of the L. E. and D. R. R. do not expect to commence operations on the extension of the line from Ridgeway to St. Thomas before spring, but the work will then be pushed in order to make early connection with the London and Port Stanley road.

A Toledo dispatch says that General Passenger Agent Houk, of the Ohio Central, has declared war against the C. H. and D., the Hocking Valley and the Pennsylvania roads. As the Ohio Central is part of the Big Four and Lake Erie system, as the C. H. and D. runs out of Detroit, a rate war on east-bound passenger traffic will ensue. If the dispatch be well founded, it looks as if it was, since the Ohio Central has, it is reported, instructed its Columbus agents to make an open rate to Chicago of \$6 until the opposition either cuts it or comes to terms. The origin of the war is the Pennsylvania's railroad—what is that?—the passenger association governing a particular territory grants an excursion privilege to one of its members, the other members will not enter into any competition. The Ohio Central is not a member of the Central Passenger Association, but it did the association the courtesy of asking its approval of a Columbus-Chicago excursion for Oct. 6. The Pennsylvania and the Hocking Valley, without consulting the association, bucked the excursion. The Ohio Central tried it again on Nov. 10, and again the two roads spoiled the business. Now it seems Mr. Houk is going to give the Pennsylvania and the Hocking all the cheap business they want by cutting the rates to pieces.

Lumsden, re claim of Mrs. Secord for damages sustained by her on an alleged defective sidewalk on the Governor's road; referred to the reeve and the highway committee. The ditch at Brynston asked for by Messrs. Lumsden and others was referred to the reeve with power.

McDougall were appointed a committee, with power, to act on the matter. Andrew Elliott, Samuel Riddle and Harry Parsons were paid for sheep killed by dogs. One of the Embro church officers complains of wood pilfering.

Brantford Dufferin Rifles will hold a church parade Sunday, Nov. 20.

The Sandwich dock has been completed and accepted by the engineer.

The annual meeting of the Agricultural Society of North Oxford will be held on Jan. 13.

Sneak thieves entered the bicycle club house, Brantford, last week and stole a number of small articles.

Mr. F. C. Hughes, of the Imperial Bank staff, Ingersoll, has been transferred to the St. Thomas branch.

S. F. Taylor & Son, manufacturer of boots and shoes, Walkerton, who assigned recently, are about to leave the town.

It is rumored that Mr. J. Cawthorpe, of Thamesford, has been left a fortune of \$25,000 by relatives in England.

It is reported that the Windsor company laying the new gas line has consolidated with the Ontario Natural Gas Company.

Rev. W. Patterson, B.A., of Leamington, has accepted a call from Walkerton. His present pulpit will be declared vacant on Nov. 27.

The Canadian steamer Bannockburn, which went ashore near Kincardine in the gale, has been released, and is now on her way to Port Huron.

Crown Attorney Bowdler, of Berlin, has been granted a six months' leave of absence, and leaves Dec. 6 on a visit to the Holy Land and elsewhere.

Hog cholera has again broken out in Anderton. A few days ago sixteen belonging to B. Gignac were slaughtered to prevent the spread of the disease.

Charles Davidson was found dead in bed at the house of refuge, at Woodstock, on Friday. He was 78 years of age, and for a long time resided in Zorra.

On account of diphtheria being in the neighborhood, the Becher postoffice has been closed for a few days, and the mail has all been handled at the Wallaceburg postoffice.

Mr. James Lockie, of Waterloo, died very suddenly Friday night from angina pectoris, aged 66 years. He was in Toronto the day before and returned home on the last train.

The call from Aylmer, which Rev. Mr. Bates, of College Street Baptist Church, Toronto, recently declined, has been extended to Rev. Geo. Cross, who is now in Berlin, Germany, and has been accepted.

Thomas Fuller, for many years a banker of Leamington, has gone out of business. He has rented the premises to the Merchants' Bank, which will open a branch there. A. B. Patterson, will be manager.

Two men, McDonald and Hall, of Woodstock, got so heated in a religious controversy that one of them pointed a loaded gun at the other, and he is now summoned to answer a charge therefor in the police court.

The movement in favor of better mail service for Plattsburg, Bright, Drumbo and Tavistock has taken a definite form, and a petition addressed to the postmaster-general and circulated among residents, is being largely signed.

At the last meeting of the official board of the Charles Street Methodist Church, Ingersoll, the pastor, Rev. T. J. Atkins, received a unanimous invitation to remain a fourth year as pastor of the church. Mr. Atkins accepted the invitation.

H. Woodbridge, government inspector of fruit trees for the district of Western Ontario, has been ordered to inspect a number of trees in Essex and Kent counties. It is believed that the San Jose scale is breaking out again in those counties.

The Brantford section of the Socialistic Labor party passed resolutions on Wednesday expressing itself as being in thorough sympathy with the London Street Railway Employees' union in its fight for recognition and freedom, and ready to assist the London comrades in the most practical way known to men.

John Currie, who has charge of the Cameron estate, Windsor, says that the toll gates which were burned a couple of years ago between Windsor and Essex, will shortly be rebuilt, people are wondering what Mr. Currie means, as the county council took charge of the roads last May, and contributed a sum of money towards repairing the same.

George Wells, an employee at White-law's foundry, is suffering from a peculiar accident received a few days ago while at work in the foundry, says the Woodstock Express. Mr. Wells was engaged in chiseling some steel when a sharp piece flew up, and, forcing right behind the left eye-ball, ploved it from the socket. The injured man put his hand up to his face and the eye dropped in the palm of his hand. Medical attendance was summoned and the eye replaced. Mr. Wells is doing nicely, and will retain the use of the member.
