# FOR RAILWAY

Over Six Million Acres Likely To sum of \$1,000 be paid Dr. Fothering-Be Given Mackenzie & Mann for Hudson Bay Line.

Ottawa, June 13.-Messrs. Mackenzie & Mann are now in negotiation with the Dominion Government with regard to the construction of their proposed mentation fund committee's report, and line to Hudson Bay. More than 20 years ago a clause was inserted in the Dominion lands act providing for a land grant of some 12,800 acres per mile to assist the construction of a road to the shores of Hudson Bay. Some years later this subsidy was given to the Winnipeg and Hudson Bay Railway" Company, that is now controlled by Messrs, Mackenzie & Mann. The grant to this company was subsequently renewed, but runs out on the 1st of July unless it is renewed in the western members however, have sig-

newal should be accorded. The line in question would be about 500 miles in length, and the land grant, therefore, would be some 6,400,-000 acres in all. The area reserved for the selection of the grant lies alongtransferred to the list of augmented side the route to be traversed by the new road, but it is understood that Mackenzie & Mann are desirous of getting land elsewhere, and have expressed that wish to the federal Baysville, Tarbutt, Moorefield; Synod authorities.
