Is Cuba Recognized?

Head of the Legation to Attend a Reception.

Three Insurgent Leaders Shot While About to Surrender.

Washington, March 15.-Senor Gonzales de Quesada has at last been accorded social recognition by the administration. He is the head of the Cuban legation, established in Washington several months ago. Until now he has been ignored, but Vice-President Hobart has invited him to attend the reception to Prince Albert, heir presumptive to the throne of Belgium. This is regarded as very significant, and a possible sign of coming official

relations between the United States and the Cuban republic. Madrid, March 15 .- A great censation has been caused here by an official (Spanish) dispatch from Ravana, saying that the insurgent leaders, Caylto, Aivarez and Nunez, have been killed by other insurgents while the former were on their way to tender their submission to the Spaniards.

Official circles here claim that the action of Caylto and his companions is proof that an important section of the insurgents is anxious to accept "the legal regime."
