Berlin, Sept. 26.—The British forces in their new offensive in Flanders have penetrated German: positions to the depth of about two-thirds of a mile at several places, according to the German official communication, issued tonight. The fighting, which is of a desperate character, is continuing.

Toll of Large Merchantmen Larger Than Last Week -Thirteen Lost.

LONDON, Sept. 26.—Thirteen British merchantmen of 1,600 tons and over, and two vessels of less than 1,600 tons were sunk by mines or submarines last week, according to the weekly admiralty statement, issued this evening.

In the aggregate, this is the smallest number of vessels sunk during any one week since Germany began her intensified submarine warfare last February.

Every variety of the fruit was offered at similar prices to those quoted Wednesday during the first part of the morning, but substantial de-clines were shown toward the close owing to the haprecedented abundance of the fruit.

Plums were not so plentiful, the seak sonable appearance of this fruit having just about ended. A fair amount were offered, however, at unchanged values, and a good demand manifested. Appies are becoming increasingly scarce from day to day, and the price remains at its accustomed height of \$1.50 to \$2 per bushel.

Citron is in good demand whenever offered. Other fruits are selling at stationary prices, and the general demand for all varieties is brisk, local fruit men cialiming that the people are eating more fruit than ever before, owing to the advice of the Government to eat seasonable edibles.

Vegetables have been particularly plentiful this week. Potatoes dropped slightly, the majority of bushels selling at \$1.10 to \$1.25. This decline was not anticipated, but very welcome to housewives.
