COLD STORAGE TEMPERATURE AT ARMORIES TODAY

Coal Gives Out and Medical Boards Withdrawn From Local Centre.

26 PASSED ON THURSDAY

A stranger entering the armories today would doubtless have wondered whether the building was being used for military or cold storage purposes. LOCAL MILITIA OFFICERS WILL CONDUCT UNITS

Major Monteith and Lieut. Reid Appointed to Conducting Staff.

DUTY ON TROOP SHIPS

Will Have Charge of the Men Going and Coming From Overseas.

Major A. H. Monteith of the 1st Depot Battalion, W. O. Regiment, and Lieut. G. S. Reid, M. C. of the 22nd Reserve Battalion, have been appointed to act as members of the permanent conducting staff, which is to have charge of the troops crossing the Atlantic to and from Canada. They will leave for Halifax shortly to undertake their new duties.

Instead of the usual conducting staff, which has been in charge of troops aboard ship, a permanent staff for each troopship is being created, consisting of an officer commanding, an assistant and one subordinate officer, and this staff will remain on each local vessel returning to Canada.

Major Monteith is to act as a commanding officer and Lieut. Reid as a subordinate officer, but they will not be employed on the same boat. A similar arrangement will be made for the men both going and returning to Canada, and will assist the conducting officers sent by the unit to which the troops belonged in Canada.

Especially important is the work to be done with men returning to Canada from overseas, as they must be sifted out and separated so that they may, without delay on landing, be sent to the districts to which they belong. The necessary documents must be arranged and put in good order, and they must be instructed where and how to proceed to their homes.

Much of this work was previously done at the discharge depots at Halifax, St. John and Quebec, and caused considerable delay, so that the present arrangement will expedite the departure of the men to their districts and consequently to their homes.

COUNTY COUNCIL IS ASKED FOR GRANTS TOTALING \$1,300

Salvation Army and Soldiers' Aid Ask Assistance.

Representatives of the Salvation Army and the Soldiers' Aid Commission will address the county council at this afternoon's sitting of that body, and request grants aggregating nearly \$1,300.

The Salvation Army will ask that a grant of \$750 be made towards the erection of the new maternity wing at the Salvation Army Rescue Home, and that \$50 be granted towards maintenance of the home.

A grant of \$500 will be asked to assist in the work of the Soldiers' Aid Commission. A similar grant was made last year.

QUIET TRADING IS SEQUEL TO RUSH

Prices are reported as ranging from \$17.25 to \$17.60 per cwt. in sections of the district.

Oats continue to be plentiful. Grain dealers believe prices will not pass the \$2.50 mark, unless another severe storm makes it impossible for farmers to bring in the usual quantity of oats. Barley has not been on the square for some weeks. Farmers are holding barley for the home market, and the price throughout the country.
