ANOTHER \$200 FINE FOR HENRY GILLIGAN

Defendant Protests Innocence But Magistrate Firm.

Henry Gilligan, for the second time in a few months, was fined \$200 in police court this morning for having a bottle of whiskey which he claimed he did not have.

P. C. Albert Northcutt was in the lavatory of the Empire Hotel at 4:30 p.m. Monday, when he saw Gilligan enter. He was not suspicious, but his curiosity was aroused, so he looked around the corner and saw Gilligan place a bottle on the floor and heard it "clink" on the cement.

The defendant left and went to the bar. Upon investigation the officer found the bottle, and after satisfying himself that it was whiskey, he approached Gilligan. The bottle and the prisoner were taken to the police station.

Gilligan told the court that he did not know anything about the affair, except that he saw the constable and a stranger in the place. After the stranger left, Gilligan passed the place where he had been and kicked the bottle. If he had known it was there he would not have kicked it, he said, for it was not very pleasant to be standing near a bottle of whiskey, with a constable a few feet away.

TRANSCONTINENTAL TOURIST IN LONDON

Frank P. Linz On His Way To New York From 'Frisco.

'Frisco to New York in eight weeks in a Chevrolet car, in the achievement undertaken by Frank P. Linz, whose home is in Brooklyn, but who started from San Francisco on April 10, and arrived in London this morning from St. Thomas. Mr. Linz has traveled through three countries, going south from Oakland to San Diego, Cal., which is only fifteen miles from Tia Juana in Lower California. After traveling the Mexican side of the border for some distance he returned back into the United States. His original intention was to drive south of Lake Erie, but at the Chevrolet headquarters in Chicago he was asked to visit Flint and Detroit, and entered Ontario here. From London he is going to Niagara Falls, Buffalo, Rochester and Albany, and expects to reach New York easily by Saturday.

The worst roads he encountered were in Cooper County, Missouri, between the towns of Tipton and California. Here in the glue-like mud formed by the peculiar clay of the country, and excessive rainfall, he became mired, and in one instance had to be drawn out by a team of four horses. He stayed over four days at Jefferson City on account of wet weather. Between Kansas City and Jefferson City, 200 miles in all of heavy mud roads had to be traversed, 27 miles in intermediate grade. Near Yuma, Arizona, the next most difficult entered Ontario here. Crossing the desert sand, it was necessary for Linz and his partner to follow their machine, which readily steered itself in the sand, throwing down blankets under the rear wheels in order for them to move ahead at all. It took three days to make 42 miles at this speed. Their car was the first to come through the Pine Mountains in Arizona this season en route to Flagstaff.

In some parts of Arizona more than 100 miles from the railway station gasoline cost 35 and 40 cents a gallon, and water 10 cents a water-bag. Water has to be hauled in from the railway stations many miles over the desert, and tourists find it a costly necessity.

Mr. Linz, who was overseas with the American forces for more than a year, was the official chauffeur for General Pershing upon the occasion of the latter's visit to San Francisco. He carries a letter of introduction from John L. Davis, mayor of Oakland, Cal., and is a member of the California State Automobile Association. His partner, exhausted by hardships, stayed over in Detroit to recuperate.

Prohibition in the United States has increased the population of San Diego phenomenally, according to Mr. Linz. San Diego, because of its proximity to the Mexican border, where liquor can still be obtained, has attracted thousands of thirsty souls anxious to be within easy distance of old-fashioned liquid refreshments, available in Tia Juana, only fifteen miles away. It is also the sojourning place of many others en route to more distant points. San Diego is a city about the size of London, now with over half a million population, it is promising to catch up to Los Angeles in point of population.

G TUXIS BOYS AND TRAIL RANGERS

Boys to the number of 200 will gather at the Y. M. C. A. supper Thursday night, to be held in connection with the "Find Yourself Campaign," which is being conducted by L. M. Houlding, secretary of boys' work.

A board of vocational directors has been appointed to help the boys in their choice of future work. The board is composed of Dr. K. P. R. Neville, V. E. L. Green, R. J. Jenkins, E. A. Miller and L. M. Houlding.

Members of the Rotary Club will devote time to consult with any of the boys sent to them by the vocational directors.

Two hundred letters have been sent out to the boys who filled out the self-analysis blanks last year, so that they may have further interviews this year, if they wish.

A number of talks have already been given to boys on vocation in this city. The closing addresses will be given by J. P. Hagerman of Toronto, and E. A. Miller of this city.

Any boy who cannot be present at the supper on Thursday night may procure self-analysis blanks from Mr. Houlding.

SPECIAL FARES FOR THE SCHOOL PICNIC

Large Attendance Is Promised For Annual Affair Friday.

The timetable announcing where and when special street cars will be waiting to take pupils from the city schools to Springbank for the school picnic Friday, will be ready for publication Wednesday, the London street railway has promised.

Special fare privileges are to be granted the school children, who, on returning from the picnic, will be given transfers to carry them to their homes over any of the city lines. There are more than 10,000 children on the rolls of the public schools in London, so that a large attendance is assured for the popular outing.

The students of the London Collegiate Institute will also attend. Principals at the park will be furnished by the Western Ontario Regimental Band under the leadership of Bandmaster Slater.

POPE PEACE CONDITIONS AND WILSON'S FOURTEEN POINTS WERE THE SAME

Rome, June 1.—Pope Benedict's efforts to re-establish peace in Europe during the war were extolled by Cardinal Logue, primate of Ireland, at a banquet given at the Irish College last night, at the close of the festivities incident to the beatification of Oliver Plunkett, first archbishop of Armagh.

"There was not one of President Wilson's fourteen points that was not included in the pontiff's peace conditions," he declared. "During the late war every effort was made to induce the pope to side with one belligerent or another, but he went straight as an arrow. He made justice and right triumph over oppression."

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LOCAL NEWS

WESTERN FAIR. About 2,000 prize lists have been mailed this week by the Western Fair board to members of the fair association throughout the continent. In addition, several hundred posters have also been sent out for display in Western Ontario.

W. O. R. PICNIC.—A picnic for all members of the W. O. R. will be held some time during the next two weeks, to which all wives and lady friends of the members will be invited. Philip Pocock and Col. A. M. Smith have made the outing possible by their co-operation. Mr. Pocock will supply the lunch, and Col. Smith, who is honorary colonel of the battalion, will be in charge of the picnic. The picnic will be held at Port Stanley.

Closing of Ridout street bridge as unsafe for traffic will be discussed by No. 2 committee of the city council at its regular meeting tonight.

Following the defeat of the London bill, one clause of which would have authorized a debenture issue for a new bridge, the aldermen expressed the opinion that the present bridge should be closed entirely, as it has been found to be unsafe for traffic of only four tons weight and that it is claimed that this weight is constantly exceeded.

City Engineer Brazier refuses to accept any further responsibility for the bridge, and states that if it remains open it must do so on the authority of the council.

Al. C. G. Moorhead, acting chairman of the committee, is not in favor of closing the bridge.

"There is an appropriation for repairing the bridge," he said, "but it is made to carry four tons it can just as easily be made to carry eight or ten tons. They told us six months ago that the bridge would not last, but I notice that it is still in the same old place. I think we should stop making repairs to it immediately. There is no reason why the southern section of the bridge should be closed, and it is held in connection with this easy communication with the rest of the town."

This is the only contentious matter for discussion.

TO DISCUSS CLOSING OF RIDOUT ST. BRIDGE

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EALING SCHOOL IS GREATLY CROWDED

Plans for Additions Submitted To Board of Education Today.

Plans for additions to Ealing Public School will be submitted by school architect L. E. Carrothers at the meeting of the board of education this afternoon. Although accommodations in all the city schools are badly congested, Ealing School accommodations are believed to be really a more urgent problem than the matter of enlarging the other schools.

More than thirty pupils have been refused admission this spring at Ealing School, as many as ten prospective school beginners being sent back home in one day before Easter. The fact that Ealing school is situated in a rapidly developing industrial district is pointed to, as an additional reason why there should be no delay in providing accommodation for all pupils desiring to attend school.

Many of these pupils will not remain in school as long as pupils in other districts of the city, but will go out into the world to work at an early age. Therefore, it is urged that they should be able to start to school at as early an age as possible. Various other important matters will be discussed at the board meeting.

AMATEUR GARDENERS, TAKE NOTICE!

Announcing that an exhibition for amateur gardeners would be held next autumn at Ald. S. R. Macnease today sent out a clarion call to all local agriculturalists to get busy in their back yards and commence a "greater production" campaign that would outstrip that of the one conducted last year.

"The Amateur Gardening Association still has plenty of funds available, and these will be used to get the best produce shown at the exhibition which we intend to hold next year," he said.

"We intended to hold one last year, but the influenza epidemic interfered. We are going to have of this year, bigger and better than ever."

"With potatoes and other vegetables at their present prices there is more need for greater production than there was during the war, and it is up to every amateur gardener to get busy. The contest will be open to all amateurs and we expect to have some mighty good entries. Some of the enthusiasts have been at the game for three seasons now and they are beginning to be pretty expert at it, in spite of the fact that there was no organized campaign this year to urge people to take up the work, almost as many people are making gardens in vacant lots as in previous years. Some of them have already reaped the benefit of this year. They tell me they have already had home-grown radishes."

Few Spuds For Jail Habitues In the Winter

High Cost of Seed Frightens Governor Carter.

Governor Carter of the county jail reports that the garden in connection with that institution is in a flourishing condition, although rain is badly needed. Extensive gardening is indulged in by the governors guests, their host aiming to grow sufficient vegetables this summer to provide for their wants in the winter months.

He states that owing to the high cost of seedling a small potato crop will be harvested this season. Following the meeting of the county council next week, it is expected that further instructions as to seedling the jail garden will be issued and carried out.

INSPECTION OF CADET CORPS

Lieut.-Col. W. A. McCrimmon Reviewed Three Corps This Morning.

Lieut.-Col. W. A. McCrimmon started the inspection of public school cadet corps this morning in the armories. Three corps were examined in foot drill and physical training.

Lieut.-Col. McCrimmon stated that he was highly pleased with the work of the units he had seen so far. He also said he did not expect to see any better than those he saw today.

Empress avenue school had a large turnout this morning, about 100 boys being on parade, the work of which was worthy of commendation. The boys have been working hard under their various instructors, and are all hopeful of being able to carry off the prize.

The work of inspecting the corps will not be completed until Friday. The results of the inspection will be known Saturday morning, when points of the various units are compared.

KNIGHTS OF COLUMBUS OPEN ANNUAL MEETING

Port Arthur Mayor Extends Civic Welcome To Delegates.

Ontario state deputy, was presiding at the opening sessions. The civic welcome was extended by Mayor Matthews at the opening of the first business session at 11 o'clock.

ORPHANS ARE TO HAVE MOTOR RIDE JUNE 25

London Motor Club Will Give Youngsters Annual Treat.

At a meeting of the executive of the London Motor Club, held last night here, it was decided to provide the annual outing for the orphan children in the city, to be held in connection with the annual meeting of the club on Friday, June 25. On this day the children will be guests of the members on an auto sightseeing trip through the district.

A distinctive emblem, stamped in metal for the club has been decided upon, and will be ready for issue about July 1. The emblem, used previously, which is that of the Ontario Motor League, will be discontinued. The new design will be placed on the radiator and is very pretty.
