The most important of his discoveries was a process for making gas which reduced the cost several cents a thous-and feet. He devised a gas engine which produced more power from a given amount of gas than any steam engine ever perfected. He came to England in 1862 and was

engaged in the Leblanc soda industry. There he introduced his process for re-

There he introduced his process for re-covering sulphur from alkall waste. In 1873 he, in company with J. T. Brunner engaged in the manufacture of am-monia soda by the Solvay process, which he greatly improved. These which he greatly improved.
