

Dr. Stephenson has issued a call for delegates to Tokio, in which he says: "This year's world's Sunday school convention at Tokio, Japan, will be the eighth world's Sunday school conven-tion. The last was held in Zurich. Switzerland, July, 1913, when the invitation was extended to hold the 1920 convention at Tokio, and was unanimously accepted.

"The convention is backed by a promotion committee of 60 of Japan's leading men and a committee repre-senting the missionary forces in Japan and the native Sunday schools. Only approved delegates will be allowed to go in the Methodist party. Sightseers will be accepted as members of the delegation."
