

### BROKER PUTS ONUS ON WADDINGTON

Robert J. Law Examined on  
Affairs of Ford City  
Syndicate.

Interesting evidence was given by Robert J. Law, real estate broker, Toronto, at yesterday's hearing in the Standard Reliance Inquiry before Official Referee Cameron at Osgoode Hall. He said that an overdraft against him of \$4165 was not due by him to the Standard, as he had an arrangement with the late Mr. Waddington to draw on the Standard, and if there were an overdraft there Waddington owed the money.

Law further stated that Douglas Hallam, Toronto, and Geo. Forbes, Mississauga, were the only ones who paid any cash into the Law Securities. Each contributed \$2000. He said there were some assets in existence "somewhere."

Law said he acted as secretary to the Ford City syndicate, and helped to raise funds by selling the syndicate shares. Waddington and J. O. Lundy were managers. The syndicate used the Standard Reliance as bankers and on December 31, 1918, were overdrawn to the extent of \$2215.84, which was looked after by Waddington, "by manipulating other accounts or funds."

Next year the overdraft stood at \$1459.69, of which \$1234.52 was covered by a cheque from Ford City savings account.

### Sir Henry Pellatt Chapter, I.O.D.E., Hears Annual Reports

The Sir Henry Pellatt Chapter, I. O. D. E., held its annual meeting yesterday at the Sherbourne House Club, Mrs. W. A. Kavanagh, vice-regent, in the chair. The treasurer reported receipts for the year to be \$2100. Of this \$542 had been donated to hospitals and institutions, \$510 to the blind and Pearson Hall, \$710 to child welfare, \$140 for material for clothing for the needy, \$260 for groceries, etc. \$84 for other expenses, and a balance of \$56 is left in the treasury. Wool valued at \$100, which had been left over from work for the war, had been made up by the Queen Mary Circle into shawls for the children cared for by the chapter. Children helped during the year numbered 472, visits made 252. Marguerite Clarke, the little blind girl, in whom the chapter is particularly interested, was reported to be doing well at the Brantford Institute.

### Who Gets Commission For Bloor Street Deal?

A short session of the property committee of the board of education was held yesterday afternoon. Trustee J. McClelland, in the chair. The matter of the board paying a commission to any agent selling the property owned by the board on East Bloor street was sent back to the board for consideration and decision.

### LIEUT. TREES' ESTATE.

Probate has been applied for by James D. and Samuel Lee Trees, brothers of Lieut. Christopher Frank Trees, who was killed in action in France in September, 1918, and left personal estate valued at \$115,125. He bequeathed \$1,000 to each of St. Peter's Anglican Church and the Hospital for Sick Children, and \$500 to Wyecliffe College. James D. Trees, Samuel L. Trees and Alexander George Trees receive in equal shares deceased's stock in Samuel Trees & Co., and the Martin Manufacturing Co., and the Morgan Co. His mother gets the life interest in the residue, and on her death this is to be divided amongst his three brothers and his sisters, Charlotte E., Edith J. and Ethel Trees.

### MANUFACTURERS HEAR PROF. GILL

Industrial Interests Should  
Support Technical Educa-  
tion, He Says.

"It is essential that the movement should have the combined support of the two great interests of our industrial world," declared Professor L. W. Gill, director of technical education, Ottawa, in addressing the Canadian Manufacturers' Association at the King Edward Hotel yesterday on the advantage of technical education.

### CLAIM SALE IS VOID.

Action has been entered against the Consolidated Telephone Co. and D. E. Wilson, liquidator, by the Caledon and Erin Townships, to set aside the sale of the assets of the two townships last December for \$73,419, on the allegation that the sale is void because the Ontario Railway Board failed to approve. The court is also asked to set aside the winding-up order granted February 21.

### FOR FRENCH ORPHANS.

The Women's Institutes of Ontario are subscribing towards a workshop for the French-Canadian Orphanage, Paris. During the past week subscriptions have been received by Miss Guerin, a donation for sewing machines for the new orphanage at Creteil, France, was received from St. Paul's Women's Institute, of Fullerton.

### CAPTAIN'S CLAIM SETTLED

By consent of parties, the \$4000 paid into court by the Standard Fuel Company and Noel Marshall will go to Capt. J. F. Eber, who sued them for an accounting on the profits of and share of demurrage, due the steamer Veronica. Defendants get costs.

### B. O. T. A. CONVICTIONS.

In the police court yesterday Sophie Dudovitch, Simcoe street, was fined \$300 for breach of the O. T. A.; Phillip Rosenberg \$200, William Howard, Chestnut street, \$500.

### ESTATE OF \$449,190 LEFT BY FRANK COCHRANE

The will of the late Hon. Frank Cochrane has been lodged for probate at Ottawa, the estate being valued at \$449,190, consisting of personal effects, and included in which are \$149,400 in the Wahnapitoc Power Company, and 1589 shares in Cochrane Hardware Company, valued at \$189,800.

### COMMISSION CLAIM REDUCED.

Judgment was given yesterday by Judge Denton for \$209.66 in favor of Fred Torno, who sued James H. King and Thomas W. Slattery for \$450 commission alleged due by them to plaintiff. Defendants admitted liability for \$209.66, which they lodged in court. They, accordingly, were allowed costs.

### "FLU" GOOD DEFENCE.

"Flu" was the predominant and prevailing defence in about thirty cases against delinquent motorists who neglected to take out their 1920 licenses when charged in yesterday's police court for their neglect. William G. Ross was assessed \$5 for passing a street car on the left while on Avenue road hill.

### Appointed Wet Nurse.

### DAMAGES WERE REDUCED.

The appellate court has reduced to \$154 the judgment of the county court of Hastings for \$243 in favor of Mrs. Emma Oliver, of Brighton, who sued the Frankford Canning Co. and the Presque Isle Canning Co. for \$500 damages for alleged rejection of 1,218 bushels of tomatoes by defendants. No costs were allowed.

### ADJOURN ASSESSMENT APPEAL.

The court of revision adjourned till next Tuesday the appeal of Baldwin's Limited against the assessment of \$235,000 on their property, formerly belonging to the British Forgings. They claim exemption under special act until after 1921.

### TRUCK DRIVER SENTENCED.

Edward Barnum, charged with being under the influence of liquor while driving a motor truck, was sentenced to seven days in jail at yesterday's police court. An appeal was lodged and court adjourned.

### GOLF CLUB STOCK DEAL.

Judge Denton yesterday dismissed the action by Keith Balfour against Donald W. Macintosh, alleged to be due for two shares in Scarborough Golf Club. Costs were allowed defendant.
