**NEW UNION STATION**  
**READY JULY FIRST**  
No Viaduct to Be Built Owing to High Cost of Labor.  
At last we have something authoritative in regard to the opening up of the new Union railway station. The depot will be ready for business by July 1, but, according to President Beatty of the C. P. R., who was in Toronto yesterday, it will be the late autumn before it is in use by the railways. Mr. Beatty says it will be impossible to build the viaduct, and level tracks will be in use which will necessitate the city and railway engineers devising some means of protection for the public at Bay and Yonge street crossings. The excuse given for the non-construction of the viaduct is the old threadbare one, high cost of labor and material.  
In discussing the future possibilities of the Union Station Mr. Beatty incidentally confessed that the C. P. R. were greatly disappointed at the meagre use the public made of North Toronto station.  
In referring to extensions and construction on the C. P. R. generally during the coming season the president said that if the railway could obtain a good supply of labor this year would be a record one in construction. The company, he said, were applying for charters to open branch lines in Saskatchewan, as there is a lot of territory out there without adequate railway facilities.  
Mr. Beatty is predicting and expecting a tremendous immigration from Europe this summer and autumn. Two new liners are being built in Scotland to cope with the expected traffic. A third liner of 22,000 tons is also being built to be placed on the Pacific route, so as to improve the traffic with the orient. The new boat is to be named the Empress of Canada.

**MINERS WILL ASK SUPPORT OF UNIONS**  
London, Feb. 6.—The executive of the Miners' Federation declared today that in view of the refusal of Premier Lloyd George to introduce legislation to give effect to the report of the commission which investigated the situation with regard to mining, recommending nationalisation of the mines, it had decided to ask that a special trades union congress be convened to enforce the miners' demands. Premier Lloyd George met the miners yesterday in private conference. The proceedings were not officially reported, but it is understood he refused to accept the proposition of nationalization.
