BERLIN, Feb. 24, via London, Feb. 25.—(Delayed).—The magistracy of Berlin has raised the maximum pork prices at the request of the butchers of the city, who are unable to secure swine at existing prices. The new prices run from 80 pfennigs a pound for a head without lowls to 160 pfennigs. HAMILTON. Saturday, Feb. 26.—Rev. J. J.
