ANNUAL REPORT OF CANADIAN PACIFIC

Decreased Earnings and Increased Working Expenses Makes Difference of Three and a Half Millions.

The annual report of the Canadian Pacific Railway shows that the gross earnings for the year ended June 30, 1908, amounted to \$71,884,173, and the working expenses to \$40,501,807, leaving a net balance of \$31,382,366. In the previous year the gross earnings were \$72,217,227, and the working expenses, \$40,942,218, leaving the net earnings at \$31,275,009. To this had to be added \$1,127,390 earned by the steamships in excess of the monthly amounts, and another \$1,541,474 interests and dividends on various railway bonds held by the company, making a total of \$34,444,860. From this fixed charges to the amount of \$8,770,076 had to be deducted, leaving a surplus on the year of \$15,674,784, as against a surplus of \$16,160,053 in the previous year. After payment of \$80,000 to the pension account, \$800,000 to the steamship replacement account, and \$14,248 for the various dividends, there remained a net surplus for the year of \$8,757,715, as against a net surplus for the previous year of \$9,351,985. The working expenses for the year amounted to \$40,501,807, as against \$40,942,218 for the previous year. The report announced that the directors had arranged to get a substantial control of the Alberta Railway and Irrigation Company, at a cost of \$2,000,000. This company owns 113 miles of railway in Southern Alberta, as well as an important colliery, and about 425,000 acres of land, most of which is served by irrigation ditches. For some time it had been operated by its owners as a close friendly connection of your company, and the directors are now planning to take over the company and steamships, along the railway a supply of coal.

As to the proposal to increase the ordinary capital from \$100,000,000 to \$200,000,000, the report says that "while recommending this increase as a precautionary measure, there is no immediate necessity for issuing any portion of the additional amount, as you have ample funds in hand, but with your vast property in a growing country the demands for stock, involving large outlays, are sure to continue, and your directors should be in a position to meet these promptly when they arise."

CAPE BRITAIN MAN IS NOW A BISHOP

Rev. Dr. Macdonald has been Appointed Bishop of Victoria, B. C.

The announcement of the appointment of the Rev. Dr. Alexander Macdonald, Vicar-General of Antigonish, N. S., to the bishopric of Victoria, B. C., came from Rome a few days ago. Bishop-elect Macdonald, of Victoria, B. C., was born at Mahood, N. B., on February 18, 1838. His education was begun in his native place, continued at St. Francis Xavier's College, Antigonish, and in the Province of Rome, where he was ordained to the priesthood on March 8, 1864, by Cardinal Parocchi, when he received his Doctorate of Divinity. Soon after his ordination he was appointed one of the professors of St. Francis Xavier's College, and took charge of the advanced classes in English, Latin, Philosophy and Christian Doctrine. In 1893 he took charge of the parish of St. Andrews, where he still labors. In 1900 he was appointed Vicar-General of the Diocese, and St. Francis Xavier's College conferred on him the degree of LL.D., in 1905. He was appointed two years ago a member of the Theological Commission preparatory to the holding of a general council of the Catholic Church in Canada.

Dr. Macdonald has always been an indefatigable worker. While attending to his duties, he found time to write extensively for such Catholic organs as the Antigonish Casket, the American Ecclesiastical Review, The Homiletic and other Catholic publications on both sides of the Atlantic.

During recent years the following works issued from his pen, namely, The Symbol of the Apostles, The Symbol in Sermons, The Sacrifice of the Mass, Questions of the Day, in two volumes, The Merits of the Sacred Heart and The Sacraments. As a theologian, as a linguist and as a writer he has few or no superiors in the Dominion of Canada.

His removal to his new sphere will be an irreparable loss to his native diocese.
