TWO YEARS FOR THEFT

Henry Cohen, a Jewish Lad, Sent to the Reformatory—Six Drunks Dealt With.

Charged with stealing \$26 from the Princess Theatre, fourteen-year-old Harry Cohen, a Jewish lad, was this morning sentenced to two years in the Boys' Industrial Home. The youthful prisoner was arrested by Deputy Chief Jenkins and Detective Patrick Killen after he had purchased a ticket for Westfield and was about to board the train at Fairville on Thursday last.

Cohen's father was in court this morning and judging from statements made by him the boy's record is not of the best. Mr. Cohen said that he could do nothing with his son who would not attend school and was rarely home at night as he generally managed to procure enough money to pay his board elsewhere.

The little fellow, who felt his position keenly, admitted his guilt and was told by the judge that he had done wrong. He cried bitterly when being taken from the guard-room to the jail.

From present information, young Cohen will be the only Hebrew in the industrial home. Six prisoners were gathered in by the police between nine o'clock Saturday morning and the same hour in the evening and all were in court this morning.

Thomas Roach, a follower of the craft of St. Crispin, who when arrested was armed with a cobbler's kit and \$4.33, paid a fine of \$4 for drunkenness. The Allan Hillman paid \$4 for a similar violation of the law.

William Lantulum was remanded also for drunkenness. Mary Ann Brooks, for being drunk on Frederick street was fined \$8 or two months in jail.

Edward McCausland, was fined \$8 or two months and Robert Manning \$8 or twenty days for similar offences.
