Thus there are but the following ways of being registered with the Medical Council, as a matriculated student:

I. By passing the High School Intermediate with Latin.

II. By being a graduate, or a matriculate in Arts, in a British, or Colonial University.

Evidence of having passed the Matriculation Examination in any British or Colonial University, or that required by the Medical Council, or by the various Colleges of Physicians, or Surgeons in Great Britain and Ireland, or that of the College of Physicians and Surgeons of Quebec, is also accepted by Trinity Medical School, and by the University of Trinity College.

Students from the Maritime Provinces, Manitoba and the North West, British Columbia, the West Indies, the United States, or from any quarter, who do not take the Council's examinations, will be admitted to attendance on lectures in the School, but must present themselves for the Trinity University Medical Matriculation Examination, which takes place twice a year,—on the second Friday and Saturday in the months of October and March, or for the matriculation in the University of Toronto at the usual time.

The matriculation of the Universities may be passed at any time before graduation. The subjects embraced in the Trinity matriculation in medicine are essentially the same as are required by the Medical Council of Great Britain. Application for this examination may be made to the Dean of the Faculty of Trinity Medical School, up to the evening of the day before the examination. For details as to this examination, see page 17 of this Announcement.

Trinity Medical College, EXAMINATIONS.

Examinations will be conducted at the close of each session, to be known as the *First Year's*, the *Primary*, the *Thira Year's* (which is optional), and the *Final* Examinations, respectively.

The subjects of the FIRST YEAR'S Examination are as follows: (1) Anatomy and Physiology of the Bones, Muscles, Ligaments, and of the Viscera of the Abdomen and Thorax. (2) Elements of Inorganic Chemistry, including Elements of Natural Philosophy, Electricity, Heat and Light. This examination is required by Trinity University, Trinity Medical School, and the Medical Council.

The PRIMARY Examination embraces the following subjects:

Descriptive Anatomy, Physiology and Microscopical Anatomy, Chemistry Theoretical and Practical, with Toxicology, Botany, and Materia Medica.

The Primary Examination may be passed at the close of the second Winter Session. A certificate of having passed it, in any
