**Baltimore in American League?**  
The latest rumor circulating regarding the transfer of the Washington franchise to Baltimore after the close of the present season. For the last two years the stockholders of the Washington club have lost money, and as the situation at the capital is not improving some definite action is expected to result. It is said that Jack Dunn, president of the Baltimore International League club, will be given the management of the New York Americans next year.

**Baltimore Sells Two More.**  
Baltimore, Md., Aug. 24.—Jack Dunn disposed of two more of his Orioles. Connie Mack, of the Philadelphia Athletics, purchasing Catcher McAvoy and Shortstop Shannon.  
Both are youngsters, but McAvoy has had a couple of trials in major company. Shannon was first grabbed by the Braves, but was farmed when he failed to make good. He has played sensationally at ball at times this season, but does not appear to be much of a hitter.  
Connie Mack, no doubt, will give them a good trial next spring, and if they do not show the required amount of class Dunn probably will get them back again.

The local owner now has disposed of six players: Barber, the Cubs; Fester, Thomep and Leis to the Yankees, and the pair to Mack; however, Dunn has signed a young southpaw named Howard McFall, so he is starting early to build his 1918 team.

**Giants' Star Trio.**  
It looks as if the Giants must depend almost entirely on the pitching of three star left handed—Schupp, Sallee and Benton—to sweep them into the world's series in October. These southpaws have won, collectively, forty games this year, and have suffered only thirteen defeats. Schupp's record is sixteen wins and six lost. Sallee's thirteen and four and Benton's eleven and three. Sallee has won ten in a row. Benton, who had won nine straight, was charged with a defeat when the Cardinals beat the Giants in the second game on Saturday. Benton relieved Tesreau in the seventh frame with the score tied, and in the eighth Cruise scored the winning run on a pop fly, which should have been eaten by either Holke or Hardien. Hard luck for the Rubel!

**No 500 Hitters.**  
Philadelphia, Aug. 25.—With the pitching improving every year, the major leagues will never see a 500 hitter, according to Connie Mack's way of thinking. The Athletics' general also thinks that another 400 hitter is a rare possibility. Ty Cobb has a great chance to reach the mark this season, but it is doubtful if he will accomplish the feat. The nearest any player ever came to hitting 500 was in 1887, and "Tip" O'Neill of the famous St. Louis Browns was the man. That season "Tip" hit 492. But he had several big advantages. It took four strikes, instead of three, to retire a batsman, and while five called balls were necessary to get base, they counted as a base hit.

**Bender a Surprise.**  
One of the surprises of the present big league baseball season has been the work of Chief Bender, the former star pitcher of the Athletics. The other day he secured his third successive hit-out allowing the Chicago Cubs only one hit. He pitched to only twenty-eight batters during the game. Bender was always looked upon as one of the game's greatest twirlers. Connie Mack once said that the Chief was the best money pitcher in the world. As pitcher of crucial game Bender has had few equals.

**Willard to Defend Title.**  
Detroit, Aug. 24.—Possibilities of Otto having the next boxing match for the heavyweight championship of the world appeared a little better today when Champion Jess Willard told Matt Hinkel, a Cleveland promoter, that he would be glad to defend his title against the winner of the Fulton-Morris bout at Canton Labor Day.  
Hinkel visited Willard on Wednesday and made him the \$50,000 offer. While Jess did not jump at it, he is considering it and has made a tentative promise to take it up.

## THE HARDWARE MARKET

(Hardware and Metal, August 25.)  
Although a large number of important price changes, all in an upward direction, have taken place this week, there has been more or less of a halt in the upward trend of prices in iron and steel. This may be only temporary, but the feeling is that a readjustment has begun and will proceed as rapidly as could be expected under present circumstances. Ingot metals generally are inclined towards weakness.  
Malleable fittings and bushings, cast bushings, cast plugs and unions are one of the important lines to move upward. Reaping hooks, hay knives and scythes are lines of harvest tools that have been increased in price. Other lines in which advances have taken place include well wheels, hose reels, stove casters, rat and mouse traps, plunger leathers, valve leathers, valves, etc. Last week's declines were registered in bar copper and sheet copper. Brasses and bronzes are in very firm market, manufacturers of brushes experiencing difficulty in getting supplies of bristles for some classes. Linseed oil is in firm market, due to the upward tendency of flaxseed. Business has been fairly good during the week.

**Meighen Steps Up.**  
Hon. Arthur Meighen was sworn in as secretary of state and minister of mines in Ottawa yesterday afternoon. He was promoted from solicitor-general and will for a time continue to carry on the work of both offices.

## NOTICE TO SPORTSMEN

The New Brunswick Game Act was amended during the last session of the Legislature in the following respects:  
**CLOSE SEASON FOR WATER FOWL**  
(a) Any wild geese, brant, teal, dusky duck, commonly called black duck, or any other wild duck, between the first of December in any year and the first day of September then next following, at 12 o'clock noon, excepting that black duck may only be killed or taken between the 15th day of September in any year at twelve o'clock noon, and the first day of December next following.

See Sec. 8 (1).  
**BEAVER AND SABLE**  
Close season extended to July 1st, 1919.

**DEAD GAME**  
It is unlawful to have in one's possession, or to keep in cold storage except under a permit issued by the Minister of Lands and Mines, the carcasses or any portion thereof of any moose, caribou, deer, or of any game animal or game bird. This includes green hides or pelts of game animals.

See Sec. 8 (5).  
**EXPORTATION OR SALE OF PARTRIDGES**  
Every Warden is authorized to seize on sight and confiscate:  
(a) Any partridge attempted to be exported in violation of section 6, or which there is reasonable cause to suspect are intended to be exported. Any sale between the date of the passing of this Act and the 15th day of September, A.D. 1919. Any partridge so seized, or forfeited, shall be sold by the game warden or other person making the sale, after paying the expenses thereof, at such time and place as he shall think fit, and the proceeds of the sale, after paying the expenses thereof, shall be applied in the same manner, as the money received from the penalties are applied under this Act.

**LICENSE FEES**  
The fee for license to hunt and kill one bull moose, and one bull caribou and two deer will be to a non-resident of the Province, \$50. To a bona fide resident, \$2, but no such license shall be issued to any one under 18 years of age.

**COLD STORAGE**  
Notwithstanding anything contained in sub-section (5) of section 3 of The Game Act, 1909, the Minister of Lands and Mines may issue a permit to any person to keep in cold storage during the close season the carcasses or any portion thereof of any moose, caribou, deer, or of any game animal or game bird, for his personal use only.

**TRAPPING OF GAME**  
It is unlawful to trap any game except such fur-bearing animals as are exempt by the Game Act.  
See Sec. 4 (2) (b).

**WILD BIRDS EGGS**  
The eggs of partridges, wild duck, wild geese, seagulls, or any other wild fowl, the hunting of which is regulated by the Game Act, may not be disturbed or taken.  
See Sec. 4 (6).

**GUN PERMITS**  
Permit to carry a gun in the forest during close season can only be issued by the Minister of Lands and Mines.  
See Sec. 4 (7).

**BIRD LICENSES**  
A \$20 non-resident hunter's license carries with it the right to shoot game birds.  
**WILD GOOSE AND BRANT TAKEN BY RESIDENTS OF THE PROVINCE FOR DOMESTIC PURPOSES**  
The section relating to the taking of goose and brant, as above described, has been repealed.  
See Sec. 8 (1).
