



Common Sense Advice by a Distinguish ed Specialist.

Houlton, Me., April 22-The points situation in Aroostook shows no sign of improvement this week. The price re-mains at seventy-five cents a barrel. It looks now as if the acreage to be planted this season will drop off 25 per cent. from that of last year. This will be mainly due to the inability of the farmer to obtain fertilizer. There are two causes for this; one, that many of the farmers, owing to the low prices of po-tatoes last winter, have been unable to pay for their fertilizer bought in 1914, and the other, the inability of the shipment of potash from Germany to a large extent. It looks now se if potatoes ought to be a pretty good thing the coming win-ter; for the probabilities are, that with the low price of potatoes and the high price of corn, wheat and oats, the west ern farmers will plant more heavily of these grains. It is reported that the south, owing to the small demand for cotton, has planted a large acreage of potatoes, so that the Aroostooks farmen need not look for a high price early in the season. To is estimated that there are still 8, 000,000 bushels of potatoes in the coust try. Many are waiting for the price to go over the \$1 mark before disposing of the season.
