EDDIE COX MAKES SENSATIONAL PLAY

Trojans Now Have Three Lead by Winning Last Night.

It was "Eddie Cox" night in the South End League fixture last night. In making his throw, Eddie pulled off one of the most sensational catches seen in many a day when he robbed Price of a triple in the first inning. The hit was between Bartlett and Nelson. Cox in right hit Eddie made a great run and as the ball was going over his head, leaped and snatched it with his gloved hand. The force the ball was traveling spun him around completely. The large crowd gave the popular Trojans a big hand. Not content with this, Eddie had the honor of punching over the "Trojans" first run in the second inning, stole a base, scored a run, relieved Nelson behind the plate in the fourth inning, and hit a screaming double to wind up the night's performance. No wonder the Trojans won, 15 to 4.

Besides placing themselves three full games in front of the league title, the Trojans quashed their beating averages at the expense of Diggs and Nelson. Merryweather, Wiley and Daley got three hits each and in all the Trojans collected 11 safeties. They hit hard when needed.

Diggs started out well for the Royals and only sloppy fielding on the part of his teammates in the fourth inning put the game in the cooler for the Trojans. He was relieved by Nelson who got by nicely for two innings. Daley twirled good ball for the winners. He kept the hits well-scattered and struck out 9 men.

Thinks Trip Should Help the Game in Foreign Countries.

Always it has been my fondest hope to see baseball, the game with which I have grown since a boy, made an international sport of the world as the national pastime of America, says John J. McGraw, manager of the New York Giants. I really love my profession and it means much more to me than the mere winning of pennants. It is my ambition to see the game firmly established in every country of the world before I pass out.

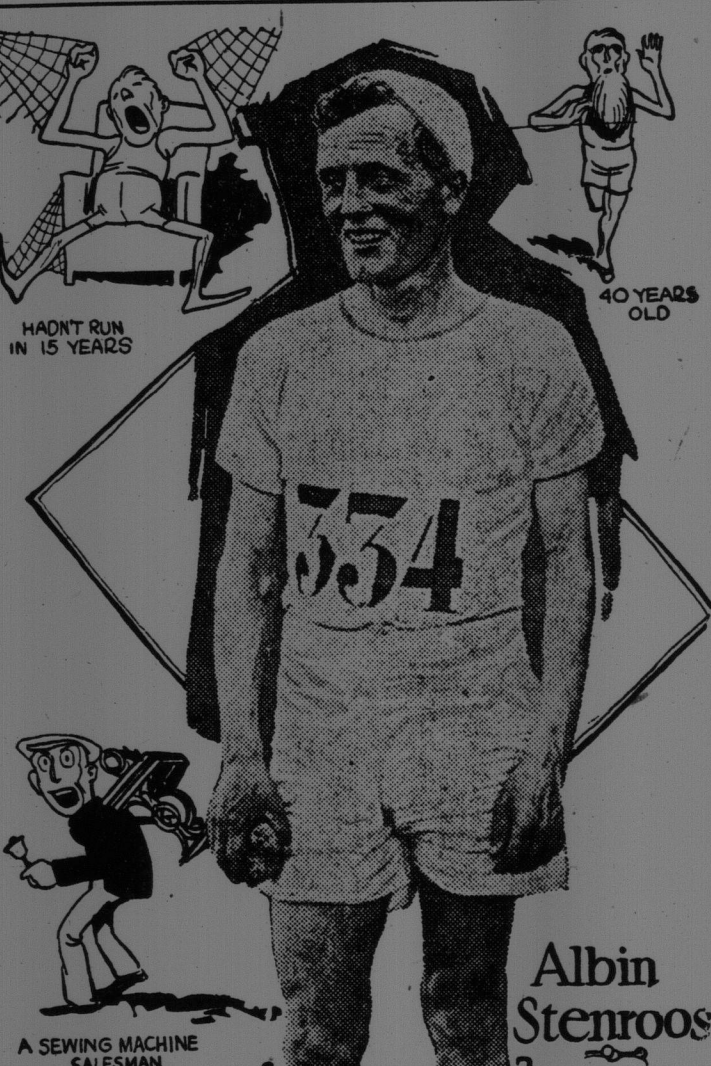
That statement, sentimental as it may sound, may explain to baseball fans my eagerness to arrange these tours around the world. It will express my great satisfaction in the recent unanimous vote of all the clubs in both major leagues granting permission and endorsing the European trip the plans of which have just been completed for the Giants and the White Sox to make a tour of the prominent European countries immediately after the World's Series in October. These clubs are selected because they represent the big cities of America. I believe that all these club owners have sensed what such a tour means to the game in general. Baseball people are now looking to the future.

Our tour will include England, France, Germany, Belgium, Scotland and Ireland. We will make a point of playing exhibition games in every section of Europe where teams of leagues are already organized. This will give the pioneers over there fresh courage, I think, to keep at it until the game is finally established in all those countries. When the world understands baseball and loves it I will be quite content in the thought that my efforts have accomplished some thing.

He says in part: "No doubt this committee has made mistakes, as any organization is bound to do at times, and particularly we agree that they made a mistake in connection with the Canadian Swimming Association."

"We have decided that this is the proper time to start to prepare for the annual meeting of the association and have already formed an organization with this end in view."

"As we stated some time ago the Manitoba branch proposes to insist on a western team, and unless something new develops before the annual meeting of the A. A. U. of C. there is no doubt the necessary change will be made in the constitution of the Canadian Olympic committee."

"At the meantime we do not propose to criticize the Canadian Olympic committee or any of the members of that committee, until we hear their report at the annual meeting of the A. A. U. of C."
